Casey Taylor is already in the Pennsylvania Wrestling Hall of Fame. Already a legend at Reynolds High School. He didn't need this gig to nail down a spot as a Reynolds Wrestling legend. The fact that he *wanted* this job speaks volumes about our new coach. Casey Taylor cares deeply about the Reynolds Wrestling program. Cares enough to put his own neck on the line to safeguard it because when you really understand the situation Coach Taylor has placed himself in, there is actually very little for him to gain. If he's

successful, no one will blink, because he's expected to be successful in a program that has never known anything else. But, if he falters, then real damage can result.

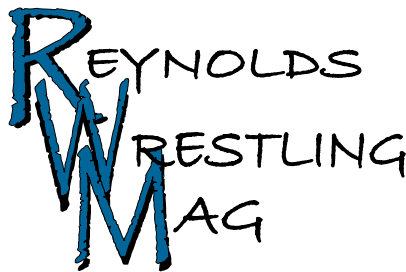
It doesn't seem that long ago that Coach Taylor was out on the mat as a high school wrestler. I remember those days and had the privilege of writing about two of his three state championships. The one thing that I remember most about Casey Taylor, the wrestler, is the way he responded when he got behind. It didn't happen very often

during his 123-10-2 career, but when it did, he was like a man possessed. He never boo-hoed or made excuses, he got busy. He amped up his game and didn't stop working until he found a way to win. Looking back, I think Casey reveled in the challenge that the sport of wrestling provided him and he simply loved to compete.

You know it's funny, and it didn't get talked about much last season, but the fact is that Reynolds lost the last two dual matches it

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wrestled last season. I guarantee you Coach Taylor remembers that, and personally, I hope he starts his coaching career with the mindset that his team is trailing.

New weight classes for the 2011-12 season are going to take a little getting used to. With four weight classes at or above 182 pounds, one could argue that the whole dynamic of the sport has changed.

The scales have tipped in the direction of the heavier guys with a potential 24 points hanging in the balance. The new weight classes that begin with the 2011-12 season are: 106, 113, 120, 126, 132, 138, 145, 152, 160, 170, 182, 195, 220 and 285.

Taylor's Task: Keep the Wins Coming!

When you really break it down, first-year head coach Casey Taylor has just *one* assignment: to win. While that may be a grossly over-simplified determination, Taylor certainly understands the lofty expectations and authentic pressures that accompany his new job.

"To be 100% honest, before the season started, I was very nervous ... constantly double-checking my practice schedules and my lists ... making sure everything was in order; but now that practice has started, my optimism is growing every day," Taylor said.

"We've got a great group of kids who are very motivated to continue the Reynolds Wrestling tradition and they are working very well together. It's a great atmosphere to be a part of."

The team's willingness to work hard has allowed Taylor and varsity

assistant coaches Joe Reichard, Michael Hills and Mark Bartolo to settle into their roles quickly.

"As a coaching staff, we are very focused ... ready to help build these guys," Taylor said. "We've got a ton of potential in our practice room."

Luckily, when Brian Hills retired after 25 Hall of Fame seasons, he didn't take all the talent with him.

Senior Dylan D'Urso and junior Austin Matthews are bona fide superstars. Blake Heim is a returning state qualifier and the Raiders welcome back 10 wrestlers who posted a dozen or more wins last season.

That's a foundation any coach would love to build around.

"I think we have a great mix of wrestlers," Taylor said. "We've got a lot of kids with experience, some who are inexperienced and another

group somewhere in the middle. When I look at this group as a whole, I see a lot of balance."

D'Urso, a team captain, is a three-time state semifinalist and has never finished worse than fourth at the state tournament (4th, 3rd, 3rd). He opens his senior campaign with a gaudy 132-17 career record and recently committed to Mercyhurst College, where he will join his brother Tony (RHS '08) on the wrestling roster.

"Great leaders lead by example," Taylor said. "Dylan can be vocal when he needs to be, but the big thing about him is that he trains hard and he competes hard. Other kids are watching him and if he slows down in one of the drills they might think it's okay to slow down. To his credit, Dylan doesn't take any time off. He's a great example in that way and it has certainly helped pushed him to become the wrestler he is today."

Heim will anchor the Raiders' lineup at heavyweight. He qualified for the state tournament a year ago while going 38-12. He

boasts 79 career wins and has the ability to make the earth shake with his patented headlock. Taylor is confident that Heim will be competitive with the best wrestlers in the state.

“Blake is going to be our steady guy at the top. We know that he will give us a solid match every time out,” Taylor said. “Plus, he’s doing the little things in the practice room to make this team better, like taking the time to show some of the younger kids the proper technique. He’s really taking a veteran approach.”

Three other seniors - Justin Rhodes, Matt Tofani and Tyler Miller - return to starting spots, while a fourth - Tommy Davis - is now ready for his role in prime time. Miller was voted as one of the team captains by members of the team.

Rhodes, 25-17 and a regional qualifier a year ago, is nursing a football injury and will not be ready for the start of the season. Once he is ready, he will return to work on his resume that currently contains 42 wins.

Miller, with 21 wins, was solid last season as was Tofani (18). Miller, like Rhodes, was a Regional qualifier while Tofani failed to advance out of the District tournament largely due to an ill-timed ankle injury. Taylor said the trio will be counted on heavily.

“All three of these guys have had success in the past and the biggest reason for that success is that they all have a tremendous amount of heart, no one can question that,” Taylor said. “Now, we are really pushing them to work hard on the technical side ... to develop a different kind of strength and they have accepted that challenge and are working hard at it.

“Our senior class is battle tested. They know their roles and they know that we will be leaning on them a little harder this year,” Taylor added. “I fully expect them to respond to this challenge.”

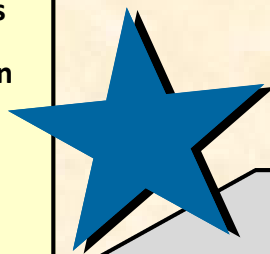
Davis, who has seen limited varsity duty the last two seasons, will need to adjust quickly to the role of a starter.

Sam Napodano and Jake Simpson are the other seniors on the roster. Napodano, who continues to progress from a severe motorcycle accident, won a pair of junior varsity bouts last season.

Matthews worked his tail off in the offseason to build on an already solid reputation - he was a PIAA runner-up last year - by knocking off a couple of nationally-ranked wrestlers. He appears primed to take his talents to the next level.

"Austin conditions like Aaron Nestor, drills like Matt Dunn and wrestles live like a caged animal," Taylor said. "He trains with a purpose and he wants everything that's out there waiting for him. He wants all of it."

"Whatever adjective you want to use to describe him, that's the kind of wrestler Austin is," Taylor said. "But, the best thing about Austin is that he remains humble. In many respects, he is just one of the guys. I don't know how many times I've caught him just sitting, talking with our elementary wrestlers. He is a tremendous example for them to look up to."

While Matthews (87-14) is the big gun in the junior class he is not the only one who possesses talent. Jamar Henry was probably the Raiders' most improved wrestler last season and saw his record blossom from 7-19 as a freshman to 21-17. He continues to make progress as does Neal Engstrom, another two-year letterman who has already wrestled 85 varsity matches.

Overall, the junior class is deep as Cam Cianci, Curtis Arnold, Matt Leise and Chris Nottingham all have varsity experience. Other junior class members are Tyler Ohl, Clayton Stoyer and Logan

Rickert. Rickert and Stoyer did not wrestle last season, but they are not without experience. It wouldn't surprise Coach Taylor to see one or both of them in the starting lineup.

"They'll have to earn their spots in eliminations, but both kids are great athletes," Taylor said. "They didn't wrestle last year, but they continued to train, lifting weights and getting stronger."

"I've tried to prepare them for our December schedule and how hard it will be to win matches; so if they can withstand that mentally then I think they'll do very well once we come back home in January," Taylor said. "We're excited about the progress they have made in just the first week or so."

A severe football injury and complications that followed will keep Cianci on the sideline all season.

"We're going to miss Cam because he is a tough, hard-nosed kid," Taylor said. "I feel bad for him on a personal level because I think he would have had a chance this year to really settle into a weight class that was comfortable. Last year, and even the year before, he was pretty much all over the map for us."

The sophomore class also runs deep and boasts a dozen members led by the steady Mason McCollum who worked his way to a 30-win season as a freshman.

Alex DiGregorio (13 wins), Austin Moffett (7 wins) and Levi Stoyer (4 wins) also gained varsity experience.

"McCollum sort of attached himself at the hip with Austin (Matthews) this summer and went out and wrestled some of the best competition around," Taylor said. "I think it was good for him to be exposed to some other coaches and wrestling styles. I sense a different maturity level with him ... he's now a seasoned veteran as a sophomore. I know his goals are high and really the sky is the limit for him. We're confident we'll get big things out of him."

It was DiGregorio who filled a gaping hole at 103 pounds for RHS last season and he settled in quickly, advancing all the way to the Northwest Regional.

Other sophomores are Robert Foulkrod, Tylor Gongloff, Tyler Gregg, Trevor Griswold, Dustin McCurdy, Kegan Miller, Dallas Sposito and Denton Zeronas.

Freshman Michael Bartolo will start at 106 pounds for the Raiders, and Coach Taylor could not rule out seeing Michael Millero in the varsity lineup before the year is out.

"The biggest fear we had with Bartolo is that he would be too light for the 106 pound class, but he really worked hard to get his weight up and he came in weighing 108 or 109 so we feel very good about where he is at," Taylor said. "He's jumped right in there and mixed it up with the

older guys and he's earning their respect," Taylor added of Bartolo.

"Millero, though I'm not sure he's going to have a regular spot, will see action with the varsity," Taylor said. "We're pretty deep right there through the middle weights, but he will definitely be in the mix battling for a spot."

Other freshmen are Nick Nottingham, Dominic Rimer, James Slater, Jake Stoyer and Ryan Zeronas. Overall, the team roster includes 37 wrestlers.

"I think this is the most kids we've had out for the team in about 15 years," Taylor said. "It may shake out a little bit, but we don't have too many kids wrestling just for the fun of it. Most of these guys are dedicated to the sport and I expect them to be around all year. Our challenge as a coaching staff will be to get them as many matches as possible."

In closing, Taylor said, "I love the focus that I'm seeing from these kids. Their focus is right where I want it to be. Sometimes the more veteran kids tend to be complacent with drills, but these guys understand that it's part of the process for bringing our younger kids along and their willingness to work hard has been great. They are willing to sell out in every practice."

Taylor believes that level of commitment is what will drive the Raiders to another successful season.

Steve Popovitch's ALUMNI NEWS

As can be expected for a high school wrestling program that has had the success of Reynolds, a large contingent of alumni are competing at the collegiate level. The following briefly summarizes season outlooks and early results:

Thiel College's coaching staff is very excited about their starting line-up and 30% of it is composed by former Raider wrestlers/coaches.

The team is led by **Corey Brown ('08)**, who is putting together one of the best careers in Thiel's wrestling history. Corey has already become the program's first three-time All-American, and looks to close his career by becoming Thiel's first National Champion.

Corey has also excelled in the classroom: he's made the dean's list each semester and he's been named an NWCA Scholar All-American each of the last two seasons. Corey's gotten off to a hot start this season as he's earned a tournament championship and finished runner up in another. He also defeated a nationally ranked opponent in a dual meet against Mt. Union. He's off to an 8-1 start (his only loss was to the No. 3 ranked D-II wrestler), and is currently ranked 5th in the nation. He has already twice been named Thiel's male athlete of the week and was the initial PAC wrestler of the week for 2011-12.

Will Ringer ('09) is beginning the season as the starting heavyweight for the Tomcats after taking that spot over in the middle of the season last year and posting double digit wins.

Will placed in both of the Tomcat's early season tournaments, finishing sixth at the Ithaca Invite and fifth at the W&J Open.

Former Raider volunteer coach **Alec Miller**, is starting at his more natural 149 pound class, after wrestling up at 157 last season. His early season has been highlighted by a runner-up finish at Ithaca.

Aaron Nestor ('07) is competing in

his senior season for Rider. Aaron has moved up to 149 pounds after wrestling 141 last year. Aaron won two matches each at the Binghamton Open and the Keystone Classic. He also owns a dual match win over Princeton.

Red-shirt freshman **Clint Morrison** is also wrestling for Rider. Clint is the son of Raider great **Tim Morrison ('78)**. Clint has gone 3-3 as a starter at 184.

Tony D'Urso ('09) is in his junior season at Mercyhurst. He is starting at 149 pounds and has won a pair of matches at each the W&J Open and the Laker Open.

It was recently announced that current Raider star Dylan D'Urso plans to join his brother at Mercyhurst next season.

Cody Kelly ('09) is competing in his junior season at Cornell University

(currently the fifth ranked D-I program), but has yet to see action.

Luke Taylor ('10) is starting at 165 for the Coast Guard Academy. Luke opened the season with a runner-up finish at the Roger Williams invitation-al, going 4-1. Luke then went 1-1 at the Doug Parker invitational before being forced to withdrawal from the tournament with an injured shoulder. Luke will miss some time with the injury, but hopes to return to the mats after winter break.

Adam Matthews ('11) is starting at 133 pounds for North Carolina State University. He won his first collegiate bout before dropping a pair at the Wolf Pack Open.

Mason Beckman ('11) is off to a strong start to his collegiate career at Lehigh University.

Beckman has compiled an 8-4 record in the early going, including a 4th place finish at the University of Buffalo Open, and is currently on a four-match winning streak after going undefeated at the North East Duals.



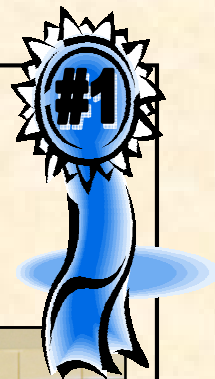

UPCOMING DUALS — Better buckle your seat belts, because January is going to be an incredible month for



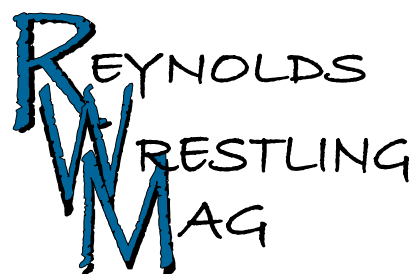

D'Urso Makes *Magie* at Manheim

MANHEIM, Pa.—Dylan D'Urso joined an exclusive club by winning his fourth Manheim tournament title, and Austin Matthews also won a championship as the Raiders placed sixth at the 16-team holiday event which concluded Dec. 29.

By winning his fourth title, D'Urso becomes just the fourth wrestler to accomplish the feat in the tournament's 42-year history. The others are Jordan Oliver of Easton, Mark Angle of Cannon McMillan and Jeff Cervone of Meadville. In winning the 132-pound bracket, D'Urso improved his season mark to 10-0 and his career ledger to 142-17.

"The coaching staff is very proud of Dylan for joining an elite list of four-time Manheim champions," said Coach Casey Taylor. "We have had some outstanding wrestlers compete at the holiday tournament who weren't able to win one title, so to win four is very, very special."

Matthews, who won the 100th match of his high school career in Wednesday's quarterfinal round (*see related story below*), kept his season rolling along with an individual title at 138 pounds. He improved his sensational season record to 15-1 and his career mark to 102-15.

"Austin is one of the quickest to reach 100 wins in school history," Taylor said. "He is a special talent that seems to be getting better each time he steps on the mat. I know I speak for many fans that love to watch him wrestle and feel that he is one of the most entertaining young wrestlers in the state."

The Raiders got third place finishes from Tyler Miller (152) and Blake Heim (285). Heim posted a 5-1 tournament record and Miller went 4-1. Other place-winners were Jamar Henry, fourth at 182 pounds, and Matt Tofani, sixth at 160. Raiders Justin Rhodes (145), Tommy Davis (195) and Logan Rickert (220) survived to wrestle on Day 2 of the tournament but did not place.

100th Win For Austin Matthews

Hills' accomplishments are not limited to his coaching ability. As a wrestler at RHS he logged a stellar 81-9-2 career record and was a state finalist as a senior. He went on to be a two-time National Qualifier at Thiel College. He also was a standout football player at RHS and at Thiel where he won four varsity letters and was the team's captain as a senior.

Moffett Family Donation Buys New Shoes for RHS Wrestlers

The name John "Bucky" Moffett will always sit atop many Reynolds Wrestling all-time lists.

That's because Moffett was the first to do a lot of things at RHS, including the first to become a Section and District 10 champion, that back in 1961.

When Bucky passed away recently, the Moffett family made a special effort to include the Reynolds Wrestling program among his beneficiaries.

Family members felt led to make a considerable monetary donation to the program through the Reynolds Wrestling Boosters Club.

Ultimately, that money was used to buy new wrestling shoes for all members of this year's high school team.

The Moffett family has roots that run deep in Reynolds and western PA

wrestling. Bucky wrestled for the Raiders in the 60's, his brother Lemoyne in the 70's, and his youngest brother Scott in the 80's.

Scott's son Austin is a member of this year's team, as is Austin's cousin Justin Rhodes.

Going way back, Bucky's great uncle Harold McClure was the first head coach at Penn (Greenville) High School and his father, John, wrestled on the first ever Penn High team in 1935-36.

During Reynolds' inaugural season in 1960-61, Bucky, a junior, won Section and District 10 titles becoming the first Raider to win those events. (Larry Uber won the 1960 Section championship while wrestling for Greenville.) His first and only loss of the season came at the Regional tournament.

His senior season, Moffett was unde-

feated heading into the postseason. He got sick the week of Sections and didn't attend school all week. He showed up for Sections and battled his way to the finals but lost a decision to an unseeded wrestler. He ended his career with a 29-2 high school record, having never lost a dual meet.

He went on to wrestle two years at Clarion, compiling an 11-5-1 record before entering the US Navy where he served aboard one of our country's first nuclear powered submarines — the USS Thomas Edison — during the Vietnam era.

Matthews Opens Season With a **BANG!**

Team Finishes Tied for 12th at Ironman

CUYAHOGA FALLS, OH — For most high school wrestlers it's a pretty ridiculous way to open the season. Maybe wrestle a couple of matches and sit around drinking slushies for the rest of the weekend. But for the few who possess extreme mat skills, the ASICS Ironman Tournament at Walsh Jesuit High School is an opportunity to compete against the best scholastic wrestlers in the country.

As a team, the Reynolds Raiders performed above expectations, just missing out on a spot in the Top 10, while finishing tied for 12th with 69 points. There were 72 teams represented at the event.

Individually, junior Austin Matthews was the star of the show, steamrolling his way into the championship finals and in the process, decking the tournament's second seed.

In the 138-pound finals, Matthews was stopped short

Sophomore Alex DiGregorio was next on the win list with three victories and senior Mat Tofani and sophomore Mason McCollum evenly split four more wins. Winning one match each were Neal Engstrom, Matthew Leise, Levi Stoyer, Austin Moffett, Jamar Henry and Tommy Davis. Michael Bartolo, Tyler Miller and Logan Rickert also competed for the Raiders.

Senior Dylan D'Urso, who had twice previously placed at the Ironman, sat out the tournament with a minor injury. The consensus was that any potential reward of placing at the Ironman was just not worth the risk of aggravating the injury.

Last year, Reynolds fans watched **Mason Beckman ('11)** complete one of the greatest careers in school history. Mason won two state titles, two Iron-man titles and finished his career with a 102 match-winning streak.

He closed out his storied career ranked second in the country, behind another PA product: Nico Megaludis. Megaludis was a three-time Class AAA state champion for Franklin Regional High School and 176-1 in his high school career; but their equally brilliant careers would end without the two PA studs facing each other, which left fans open to debate who the true No. 1 really was.

Fans finally got to see the two super-stars battle each other on Dec. 9th as Megaludis and the Penn State wrestling team traveled across the state to meet Lehigh in the 100th dual match between two schools, and I was fortunate enough to be able to make the trip up from Virginia.

The strong presence of Raider Nation helped me make a favorable impression on my company's CEO, who accompanied me on the trip.

We ran into Mason's Dad, **Ron Beckman ('82)** before we entered the jam-packed Stabler Arena, and once we made it to our seats, I looked to my left and saw we were seated near legendary RHS coach **Neal Lineman**, who had made the trip with his son and grandson. Mason's brother **Lawrence Beckman ('07)** was, naturally, also in attendance.

There were many entertaining bouts

during this dual meet, but it was the first one of the night that was the target of my attention. With the crowd buzzing, Beckman and Megaludis took the mat to open the dual.

The first period had the most action as Beckman fought off a Megaludis shot early. Beckman then was able to get deep on Megaludis' legs, and nearly completed the takedown with a dump finish, but Megaludis went into a full split and fought the shot off for a stalemate.

From here Megaludis took over, scoring a takedown late in the first period. He tacked on an escape and a point for riding time to close out a 4-0 victory.

While Mason wasn't able to pull out a victory, he proved that he's right there with the best in the country (Megaludis is currently ranked 13th), and I hope the two meet again over the course of their promising college ca-

reers.

In Mason's other recent action, he came up clutch for the Mountain Hawks against Penn. In dual that started with the heavyweights, 125 was the final bout. Beckman took the mat with the team score 18-15, needing a win to seal the match. Beckman won 3-2 clinching the dual for Lehigh.

Beckman moved up to 133 pounds to compete at the Midlands Championships. He went 2-2 in that event, beating a familiar foe, Geoff Alexander of Maryland in the consolations. Beckman wrestled Alexander several times during his high school career including an ultimate tie breaker victory in last year's state semifinals.

It is my understanding is that Beckman will stay at 133 pounds for the remainder of the season. Holding the weight became too demanding for him. Lehigh next competes at Cornell on Jan. 8th.

What you probably don't know about this Motley Crue of RHS extremists is that without them, the Raiders might not have ever been able to attend tournaments like the Ironman, King of the Mountain or Beast of the East.

"I think initially the Road Crew talked about doing a scholarship, but when the budget cuts came I approached them to see if they would be willing to help us with travel expenses," said former RHS coach Brian Hills. "Going to a tournament like Beast of the East, that's a pretty heavy expense and the school just wasn't able to pay it any more."



"We knew we wanted to do something, so we got our heads together and we came up with the idea to have a golf outing," said lifelong Road Crew member Bill Palmer.

The amount of money raised each year has fluctuated, and RC members admit there have been "good years and bad years," but their ongoing support has never wavered.

"The golf outing is always a very enjoyable time, it's held in September just before the season gets started," Hills said.

"We've never spent a dime of the money on ourselves; never bought a jacket with it, not a T-shirt," added Dan Stoyer. "Every penny we raise goes to support the kids."

One of the best memories for Reash was the first year the Raiders won the state duals title. The Road Crew helped organize an impromptu parade and held a chicken-wing reception for the team back at the Reynolds VFW.

"When I saw the looks on the faces of the kids that day, I knew that everything we had ever done was worth it," Reash said. The Road Crew hosts similar receptions each year after the Brookville duals.

More recently, the Road Crew has started buying gifts for the senior wrestlers. Though they work independently from the Booster's Club, the Road Crew always works with them to support the program in many different ways including helping out at the elementary tournament and reverse raffle.

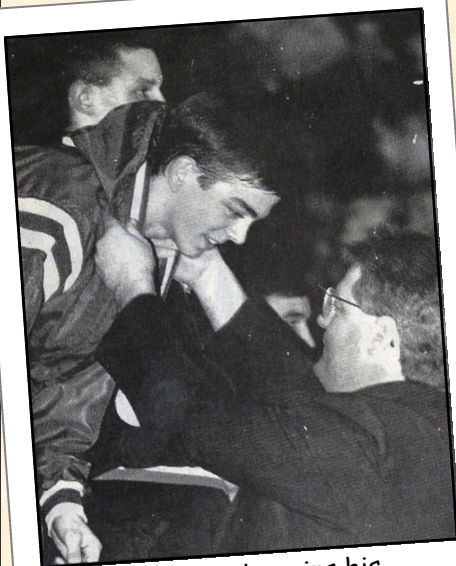

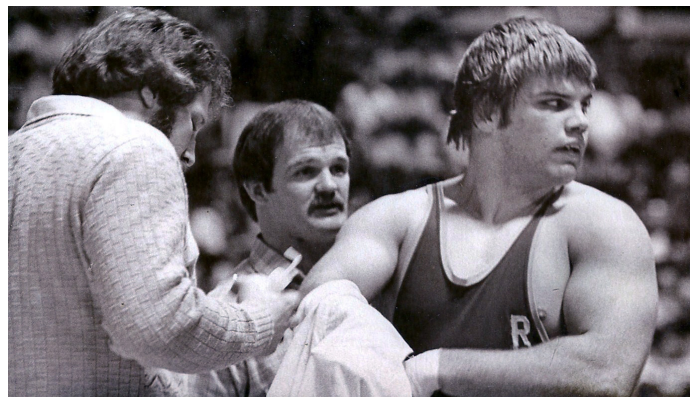

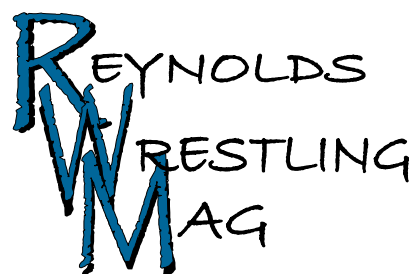
The record will show that Taylor's first team finished 16-1 in dual matches, bumping the school's all-time record to 698-78-2.

Miracles?

Cam Cianci and his family made the 65-mile drive to UPMC Presbyterian last week to schedule Cam's final surgery. After months of hospital stays, operations, complications and therapy, finally, they were getting close to putting this nightmare to rest.

It's probably a good thing they were sitting down, because nothing could have prepared the Cianci's for what the surgeon said.

"The doctor told us that he had never seen anything like it," said Cam's father, his voice obviously shaken. "He said that Cam's leg had somehow redeveloped the muscle tissue that was surgically removed. The doctor called it a miracle. He said they can't really pinpoint it, or tell us exactly what happened; but he gave Cam a clean bill of health and told him that he could go home with no restrictions. There was no need for any additional surgery."

For a family that had been through so much trauma and so much pain, it was like heaven's gates swung open and the angels started singing.

"This is a miracle was all I could think," Mr. Cianci said. "I just couldn't believe it. I still can't believe it."

Unlike his father, Cam was able to process the news quickly. He knew exactly what it meant. He turned to his father and announced, "I'm going to wrestling practice tonight!"

When he first looked down at his phone, Coach Casey Taylor thought it was a joke. A text message saying that Cam was going to be at practice that night? Yeah, right! Coach Taylor had a reason to doubt, and that's because nobody

expected Cam to participate in any kind practice this season. In fact, next season was still a question mark in the minds of many who were following his recovery.

Once confirmed, the news spread quickly around RHS that Cam was coming to practice and when Cam walked into the wrestling room, his teammates were waiting.

"It felt pretty awesome to have my teammates supporting my return and it felt really good to be back in the gym," Cam said. "I really never thought I would be able to wrestle again with having so much muscle taken out of my leg and all of the complications that I had."

"The kids were great; they really clapped it up for him. It was a real emotional moment," Taylor said of Cianci's return. "We held Cam to a snail's pace that first day because I was still in shock that he was even here."

Originally, Cam was injured in a Sept. 16 football game against West Middlesex. While running downfield on a kickoff, he got crunched in a pile of players and broke both the tibia and fibula of his right leg.



What followed over the next few months would test his family's limits.

He was taken from the football field by ambulance to Sharon Regional and on Saturday had a rod and two pins placed to help mend his fractured bones. The orthopedic surgery went well, but complications erupted, and Cam's condition deteriorated at an alarming and life-threatening rate.

Svirbly Has Cardinals Singing

John Svirbly ('02) continues to build a winning tradition as the head coach of Cochran's wrestling program.

Despite being down on numbers this season, Cochran was able to place in the top eight at the recent Tool City Tournament, while entering just 10 wrestlers.

The Cardinals also earned a bid to the upcoming District 10 Class AA dual meet championships for the second consecutive season, even though they later were forced to withdraw because of injuries.

Thiel College's **Will Ringer ('09)** dropped two very close decisions at the Bud Whitehall duals, before being bested by the nation's top D-III heavyweight in the Mt. Union dual match.

Will bounced back very well from that loss, by going undefeated at the Mel Berry Duals. Thiel wrestles Waynesburg on Wednesday, February 1st in their last home dual of the season. The match is scheduled to begin at 7pm.

Corey Brown ('08) continues his impressive senior campaign at Thiel. Corey was crowned champion at the Waynesburg Invitational with a 4-0 record. He followed that up with a perfect weekend at the Bud Whitehall Duals, going 5-0.

He then picked up a win in a dual against Mt. Union before having another perfect day at Thiel's Mel Berry Duals, going 3-0 there.

Corey's 2011-12 ledger currently stands at 26-1. He hasn't lost since early November and has won 19 straight matches. His streak has catapulted him to the No. 1 position on the latest Brute-Adidas NCAA D-III rankings at 133lbs. Corey was also named the PAC's wrestler of the week for the third time this season.

Tony D'Urso ('09) has moved up in weight for Mercyhurst College, and is now competing at 157 lbs. Tony won his first two bouts at the new weight before dropping a decision in his most recent outing.

Mercyhurst has two home duals next weekend, taking on Ashland University at 7pm on Friday, and Shippensburg Saturday at 1pm.

Speaking of new weight classes, **Mason Beckman ('11)** is responding well to a starting spot of 133 pounds. After winning multiple matches at the always tough Midlands Tournament, Mason dropped a tough 7-6 decision against #6 ranked Frank Perreri of Cornell. Mason led going into the third period, but eventually lost on a riding time point. Beckman then pulled off a come-from-behind win of his own against 17th ranked Aaron Kalil of Navy. Beckman trailed 5-2 in the third period, but rallied to tie and pulled off the win with a takedown in overtime.

Beckman continued to wrestle well winning his next three bouts, two by major decisions, before having his winning streak stopped in controversial fashion. Beckman was battling Oklahoma's Jordan Keller, when the two became engaged in a scramble at the end of the first period, Beckman rolled across his own back and the ref slapped the mat as the buzzer sounded. Mason's record for the season stands at 20-7.

Here is a quote about Beckman by Lehigh head coach Pat Santoro:

"Mason's starting to find himself a little bit," Santoro said. "He's up a weight class; but this is a better weight class for him. He has energy now. This will do a lot for his confidence, but he has to continue to grow into this weight class, get more confident and wrestle harder."

After a weekend off, Lehigh travels to New England to take on Harvard on February 12th at noon.

Luke Taylor ('10) remains out of the Coast Guard Academy's line up as he continues to recuperate from a shoulder injury.

Aaron Nestor ('07) has also been out of Rider's line up and his teammate, Clint Morrison - **Tim Morrison's ('78)** son - also missed time for Rider with an injury. Recently, Clint was able to return to competition and has won 5 of his last 8 matches.

Adam Matthews ('11) has elected for a change of scenery and has left North Carolina State University.

Adam is back home and is working, we will work to break the news when and if Adam decides where he will continue his academic and, hopefully, wrestling career.

BROOKVILLE, Pa. — Matt Tofani, Blake Heim, Austin Matthews and Mike Bartolo all went 5-0 to help lift the Reynolds Raiders to a 4-1 mark at the 17th annual Ultimate Duals on Saturday, Jan. 21.

The Raiders won their first four contests, beating Benton (53-13), Pen Argyl (33-23), Biglerville (46-15) and Brookville (38-19) to set the stage for a dramatic showdown with District 10 rival Fort LeBoeuf.

The Raiders and Bisons have a recent history of close, competitive matches and this round was no different. When the dust settled, the scoreboard read 27-27, but Fort LeBoeuf was awarded the victory based on the fact that they won more individual matches (8-6).

Still, it was a productive day for the Raiders and their rookie head coach Casey Taylor who stayed upbeat after his first career coaching loss.

At 152 pounds, Tyler Miler worked to a 5-1 decision over Trey Maher, and Logan Rickert blanked Cameron Marlowe 3-0 at 220 pounds.

Wes Phipps, a defending PIAA

state runner-up, defeated Austin Moffett by tech fall at 182 pounds and Jesse Rivera, a returning Regional qualifier, topped Neal Engstrom 5-0 at 120 pounds for Grove City's only wins.

Reynolds won the Junior High match by a score of 51-0 to improve to 3-1-1. There was no junior varsity match.

Reynolds concluded a perfect Region I campaign, honored its seniors and defeated Sharon, 52-13, all in one night's work.

Also honored were this year's RHS Hall of Fame inductees which included Brian Hills (coach and wrestling), Justin Nestor (wrestling), Jerry Kendall (wrestling), Mike Gentile (football & wrestling) and Bob Esmond (football & wrestling).

On the mat, pins were scored by Jamar Henry, Blake Heim, Mike Bartolo, Matt Leise and Austin Matthews. D'Urso missed the match with a knee injury.

Do You Believe in Miracles?

Toward the end of the surgery, Cam had developed an extremely rare condition called Malignant Hyperthermia (MH) which is an inherited disorder triggered by certain types of anesthesia. It causes a metabolic crisis and sends the body's temperature soaring above 105 degrees. The speed at which MH strikes and the rarity of the condition makes it difficult regulate before it damages vital organs. It wasn't long before a decision was made to fly him to UPMC Presbyterian for specialty care.

"After my first surgery in Sharon, that was probably the scariest part, when I woke up and saw so many people surrounding my bed ... nurses, doctors, mom, dad, my girlfriend, sister, coach (Jerry) Pacifico and my Priest. I got a little nervous," Cam said. "I didn't really know what happened, but I knew I was taking a helicopter ride to another hospital. I remember asking the priest if I was going die. He just said he was there to bless me."

After spending the weekend on oxygen, cooling blankets and a pain pump, Cam had improved enough that an orthopedic doctor visited on Monday to assess the fractured leg. As soon as the doctor saw Cam's leg, he ordered emergency surgery for a condition called Compartment Syndrome.

Compartment Syndrome occurs when the muscles in the leg become so swollen that they cut off circulation. Subsequently, the muscles and nerves die from a lack of nourishment. To reduce the pressure, the surgeon opened Cam's leg on both sides from the knee to ankle and eliminated the dead muscles.

Cam's mother, Chris, works as a nurse. She recalls that during those hours how difficult it was.

"Initially, I think that being a nurse and understanding what was happening was just terrifying," she said. "It is one

thing to deal with serious situations in a professional setting, but when it is personal and it is affecting your baby it is totally different. I think the hardest part is trying to be strong so that your child doesn't see the fear in you."

Three times that week Cam's leg was opened and three times dead tissue was removed. In all, Cam lost about one-third of the muscles in his lower leg. Because of his earlier difficulties, Cam had to have spinal anesthesia for all three of those surgeries. He was buttoned up with more than 100 stitches and numerous staples. After two full weeks in the hospital, Cam was finally discharged from Presbyterian. Unfortunately, he never made it home.

Cam became extremely ill on the ride home and he was taken by his parents directly to UPMC Horizon in Greenville where he was diagnosed with kidney stones. He was re-admitted to Presbyterian on Monday with renal failure

and went directly to surgery to have a stent placed and the kidney stones removed.

Cam had one more surgery – his sixth – to remove the stent on Oct. 18, but his body was thrown into crisis one more time on Oct. 20 and he was admitted to Presbyterian for a third time, this time to be treated for spinal meningitis related to the anesthesia used in his kidney surgery. Finally, Cam came home for good on Monday, Oct. 24th.

In the weeks and months that followed, Cam stayed busy doing physical therapy and paid monthly visits to his orthopedic surgeon who saved his leg and his life. During that time, a tutor was hired so he could keep up with his school work. He did not return to RHS until Jan. 9th.

When reliving all her son has been through, Mrs. Cianci related an episode from last summer when Cam fell asleep while driving to work early one morning. The Jeep he was driving rolled 5 or 6 times, yet Cam walked out of the emergency room with only a few bruises and scratches. "The only part of his car that was salvaged was the driver's seat. Thank God he was wearing his seat belt," she said.

It seems God has been intervening in this young man's life a lot these days.

"Prayer definitely played a huge role in all of this. Without the prayers and support from family, friends and even people we didn't personally know, I don't believe we would be where we are today," Mrs. Cianci said.

"We definitely had angels watching over Cam."

STONEBORO—Seven Raiders had falls, two collected forfeits and two others added decisions as the Raiders topped host Lakeview, 60-9, on Jan. 3.

The three Raiders who lost that night, Neal Engstrom (120), Austin Moffett (170) and Logan Rickert (220) all wrestled well.

Engstrom lost in the ultimate tie-breaker period and Rickert misfired on a late desperation takedown attempt.

“Both of those guys (Engstrom and

Rickert) could have just as easily been the winner tonight,” Taylor said. “But, sometimes it’s the tough losses that make you realize just how far you can go in the postseason. I was very proud of both Neal and Logan tonight.”

The win moved the Raiders to 3-0 in dual matches, 2-0 in the conference.

The junior varsity won its match vs. Lakeview, 6-3, to move to 3-0 while the Junior High also won, 27-3, to square up its mark at 1-1-1.

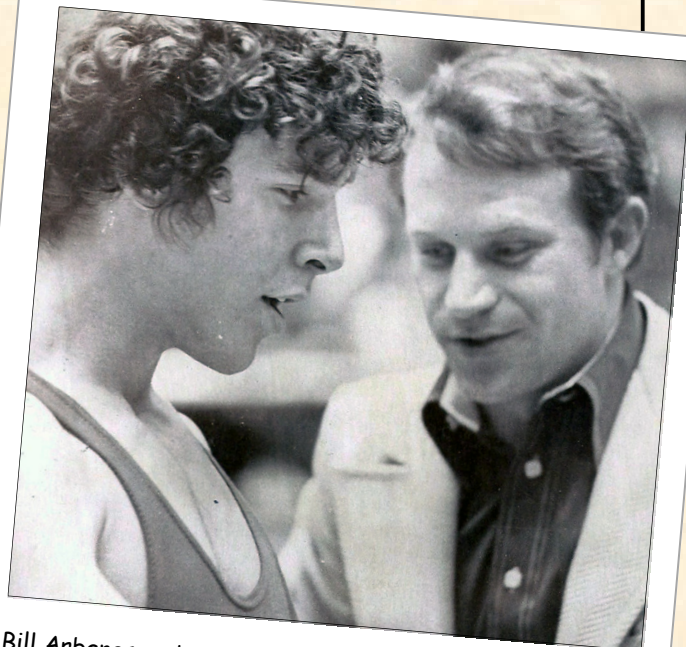

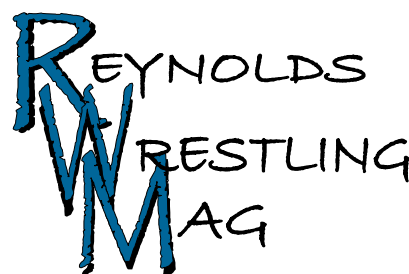
nolds wrestling program excels at.

Raiders Top Trojans for 700th Win

EDINBORO, Pa. —The Reynolds High School Wrestling program reached the 700-win milestone in the semifinal round of the District 10 Class AA Team Championships, claiming a 51-16 win over Greenville.

At the time, the win moved the Raiders' all-time, won-loss mark to 700-78-2.

With the match starting at 106 pounds, Reynolds dominated from the outset, jumping out to a 38-0 lead and had the match mathematically buttoned up before Greenville put its first points on the board.

Keyed by Mike Bartolo (106), Alex DiGregorio (113), Neal Engstrom (120), Mason McCollum (126) and Austin Matthews (138) the Raiders scored falls in five of

the first six weight classes.

Dylan D'Urso (132), Justin Rhodes (145) and Tyler Miller (152) all added major decisions as the Raiders rolled to wins in the first eight bouts.

Reynolds' other wins were claimed by Jamar Henry (182) and senior Blake Heim, who closed the match with a fall at 285.

At 160 pounds, Raider senior Matt Tofani was edged by Randy Perkins, 2-0; and at 220 pounds, Logan Rickert lost in overtime to Tyler Gentile.

Freshman Mike Millero appeared in the first varsity match of his career and was pinned by Greenville standout Cody Copeland.

The win advanced the Raiders to the championship finals of the D-10 duals for the 14th straight year.

Brown Focused on D-III National Tourney

Corey Brown has had success at every level of his wrestling career. He got started in the sport in fifth grade (which some would consider late in the wrestling rich village of Transfer) and finished fourth in the PJW State Tournament in just his third year competing.

He also had a stellar high school career, winning 112 matches for the Raiders. His 176 takedowns in the 2008 season still rank him third on school's all-time list; and he earned a state medal in Hershey to cap his senior season.

As impressive as his success wearing the Blue & Gray was, he has really blossomed as a member of the Thiel College wrestling team. Corey has been named Thiel's athlete of the week an astonishing nine times throughout his wrestling career. He just recently won his fourth-straight Presidents' Athletic Conference title, helping lead Thiel to the team crown.

The next time Brown steps on the mat to compete, he will likely become a rare 100 match-winner at the collegiate level (his current career record stands at 99-24).

Perhaps even more impressive than Corey's achievements on that mat, is that he's been able to do it while excelling in the classroom, being a leader

and role model for his peers. Corey has made the Dean's List in all seven semesters that he's attended Thiel. He has also been named a Scholar All-American, by the National Wrestling Coaches Association, in each of the past two seasons.

Thiel assistant coach, Jeff Linn put it this way: "Corey is an extremely rare form of a student-athlete. He is someone who not only excels in the classroom and on the mat, but is a great person. He exemplifies dedication and heart when he wakes up each morning. He never complains and has a contagious attitude that makes others believe they can also succeed."

As Corey's four-year wrestling career winds to a close, he still has one goal that he hopes to accomplish. Corey became Thiel's first three-time All-American last season when he finished 8th at the NCAA tournament, but this year he plans on becoming Thiel's first

national champion.

"It would mean the world to me to bring a national title back. It's all I think about, it's all I dream about," Brown said, adding that he "would have never gotten this far without all the love and support from the great Raider Nation."

Corey enters the post season with a 29-1 season record, ranked second in the country at 133 pounds.

Thiel head coach Craig Thurber echoed coach Linn saying: "Corey has been a super person and tremendous leader for our team. We're looking forward to Corey putting and exclamation point on his already outstanding career."

Corey will compete at the Midwest Regional on February 25th at Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, OH. The National Championships will be held on March 9-10 in La Crosse, WI.

Matt Tofani (160) worked his way to a decision and sophomore Austin Moffett (195) stepped up with a huge fall to keep the Raiders' hopes alive; but a fall by state-ranked Bison Evan Dailey at 220 sealed the Raiders' fate.

Blake Heim (285) scored a decision and Mike Bartolo (106) added a fall to set the final score. The loss snapped the Raiders'

At 132 pounds, junior Matthew Leise followed a similar path, going 3-0, placing first and winning his championship bout in overtime over a seasoned wrestler from McDowell.

Freshman Mike Millero (152) also took top honors, placing first while looking impressive against some strong upperclassmen.

“Clay looks better each time he steps on the mat, and Slater had a real nice come from behind win in the semifinals,” Reichard said.

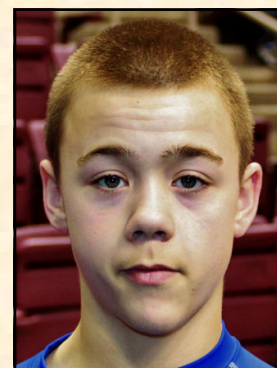

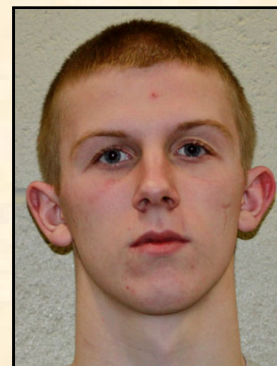

Day Two of the three-day event started well for RHS, and they had little trouble with Mt. Union, disposing of them 48-9. Jamar Henry set the tone early with a fall at 170 pounds and Blake Heim (285) and Mike Bartolo (106) followed suit as the Raiders romped by winning 11 of the 14 matches contested.

Reynolds wrestled well in the match and picked up key wins from Austin Moffett (who had a fall at 195 pounds), Mike Bartolo (106) and Justin Rhodes (138). Coach Taylor made some calculated risks with his line-up but even that reshuffling could not change the outcome as LeBoeuf won the match by a score of 33-28. The loss set Reynolds' final dual match record at 19-4.

The win over Mt. Union set up another match with a familiar opponent Fort LeBoeuf, which had gotten bumped out of the winners bracket by eventual Class AA champion BeCaHi.

It was the third meeting between Reynolds and the Bison this season in the third different location, but unfortunately the results were similar.

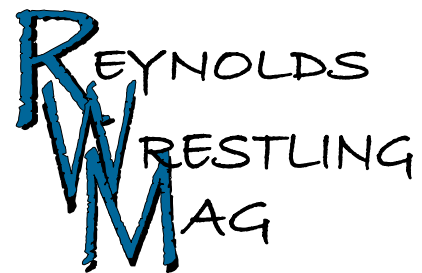
SAYING GOODBYE — It's never easy when someone we care about dies. Whendy Kozminski's passing was especially tough.

Raiders Return With 3 Medals & the PIAA Runner-up Trophy

HERSHEY —The Reynolds Raiders sent three wrestlers to the PIAA Class AA Championships. All three wrestled like champions.

Senior Dylan D’Urso closed out his outstanding high school career with his first appearance in the state finals while earning his fourth PIAA medal. Junior Austin Matthews battled his way to a second straight state finals appearance and earned his third PIAA medallion. Senior Blake Heim wrestled a near-perfect tournament, carding an impressive 4-1 record to finish in third place.

The combined efforts of the RHS trio earned Reynolds second place in the team standings, marking (at least) the 22nd time that Reynolds has placed in the top three in a post-season state championship tourna-

ment.

“I’d gladly give it up to give my guys gold medals,” Taylor said of the 2012 PIAA runner-up trophy. “But still, it was a pretty good weekend. I’m disappointed for them because I know that they wanted to win, but

I am certainly not disappointed in their efforts.”

D’Urso has been a model of consistency throughout his scholastic career winning four Section, District and Regional titles as well as four Manheim tournament championships. In his final go-round in Hershey he wrestled spectacularly. He won his opening round match

by tech fall before disposing of Line Mountain’s Seth Lansberry, 5-2, in the quarterfinals.

It was a dramatic, third-period reversal in his semi-

final match with returning state runner-up Laike Gardner that propelled D'Urso to the PIAA finals where he squared off with nationally-ranked Randy Cruz of Bethlehem Catholic.

With time winding down and D'Urso actively seeking a winning takedown, Cruz was penalized for illegal head scissors which sent the bout into overtime where, ultimately, Cruz won a 5-3 decision.

D'Urso finished 39-2 this season and closed his career at 171-19, good enough for 5th place all-time on the RHS win list. He has signed to wrestle collegiately with Mercyhurst where he will join his brother, Tony.

"We're going to miss Dylan," Taylor said of his senior standout. "He's been a leader and a role model for us for a lot of years."

Matthews was back in the state finals for the second straight year and this time his opponent was Mike Racciato of Pen Argyl, a defending champion.

Racciato won a couple of scrambles for takedowns but the real killer was a second-period spladle that the two-time champ used for three, near-fall points.

Matthews finished strong in the third period and cut into Racciato's advantage, but lost by a final score of 11-8.

Matthews closes his junior season with a 48-2 record and he is now 135-16 in his career, already tied for 13th on the RHS win list. He is a three-time state place-winner, finishing 8th, 2nd and 2nd.

Finishing 3rd, Heim wrestled a strong state tournament and put an exclamation mark on his outstanding career.

Heim was at states in 2011 but missed placing by a single match. It was a weekend of revenge—of sorts—for Heim because this year he twice beat the wrestler that kept him from placing last year.

In all, Heim posted a 4-1 record at Hershey helping the Raiders to an impressive 10-3 mark as a team.

Heim closes out his senior season with a 44-8 record. His 123 career wins tie him with Casey Taylor for 23rd place on the RHS win list and he is third among heavyweights, trailing only Mike Edwards (133) and Will Ringer (129).

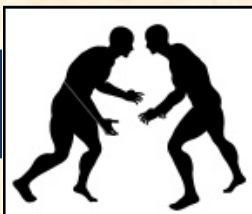

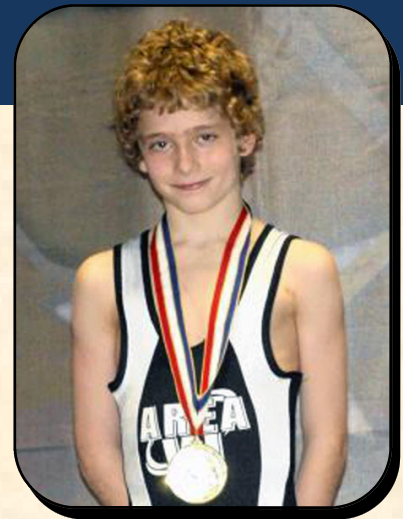

Brown, D'Urso Named Academic All-Americans; Beckman Earns Trip to D-I National Championships

Led by Thiel star **Corey Brown ('08)**, the 2012 post season proved to be successful for the former Raiders competing at the collegiate level.

Brown capped off his college career in style by earning All-American status for the fourth straight year. Brown opened the national tournament on fire, winning his first two bouts by major decision. He then lost a heart-breaking, 5-4 decision to seventh-seeded Jordan Westfall of Coe College in the quarterfinals. That loss dropped him into the consolation bracket.

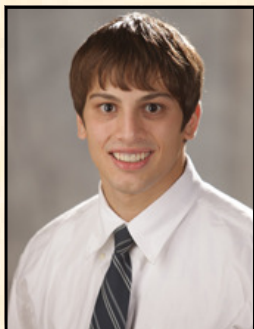
Brown bounced back by winning his next bout to secure the All-American finish. Corey finished eighth in the tournament, ending his career with a record of 109-27 and, arguably, as the top wrestler in Thiel College history.

Corey was also recently named an Academic All-American for the third straight year. As a team, the Tomcats finished seventh among the 25 ranked Division III wrestling programs with a team grade-point average of 3.417.

Lehigh University freshman **Mason Beckman ('11)** had a strong performance at the EIWA tournament. He advanced all the way to the semi-finals before falling into the consolation bracket, and eventually finished fourth.

That finish was good enough to earn Beckman a trip to the NCAA Division I National Championships. Mason got the toughest of draws in the first round and bowed to eventual national champion Logan Steiber of Ohio State.

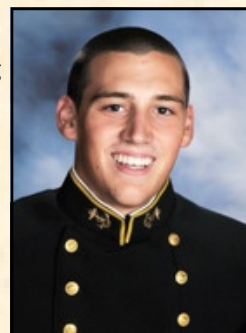
Beckman bounced back to win a match in the consolations before being eliminated from competition. He finished his freshman season with a very strong 32-15 record while wrestling at both 125 and 133 pounds.

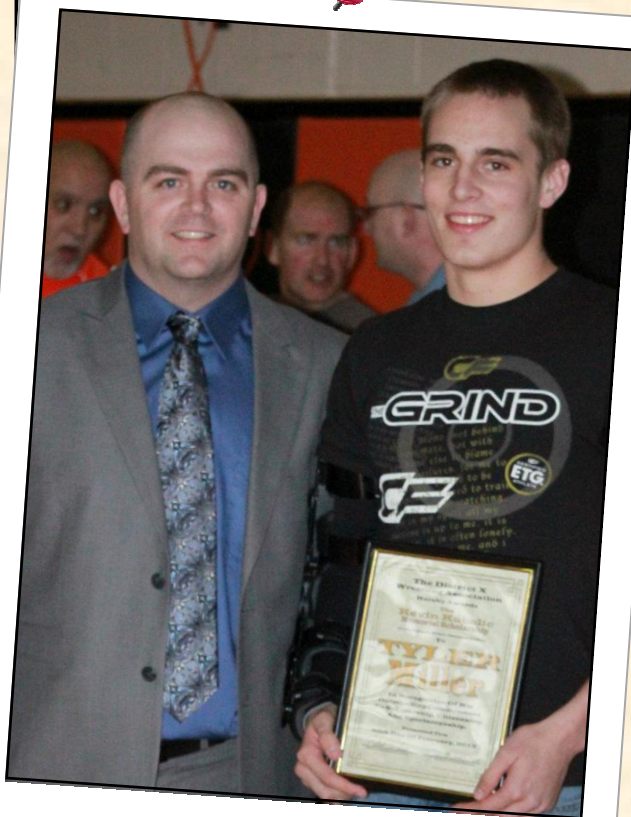
Luke entered the tournament as the number five seed, but advanced to the semi-finals with a quick first-round fall, and a major-decision over the number four seed.
