Look for the Reynolds Junior High team to have an outstanding season as well. I've peaked at that potential lineup and they are very, very solid.



Ready or Not . . . Here Come the Raiders

Nine Letter-winners Return to Lead the Charge

There's a pretty good chance that the 2012-13 Reynolds wrestling season is going to begin and end with the exploits of Austin Matthews. Matthews will come out of the gate looking for an Ironman title and then close his senior season fighting for a state championship.

In between, Matthews and his 28 teammates will have plenty of other objectives to pursue as the Raiders look to overcome a demanding schedule and continue a legacy that has spanned more than five decades. In 52 previous seasons, the celebrated Reynolds Wrestling

program has accumulated an astounding 701-81-2 dual meet record.

Beginning his second season as the Raiders' head coach, Casey Taylor is busy prepping his team for the challenges ahead, and so far, Coach Taylor likes what he is seeing.

"Austin is special, no doubt about that, but I don't want folks to be fooled into thinking that this is a one-man team," Taylor said. "We have a great senior class and some real balance, top to bottom. Once we get the right guys plugged into the right weight classes ... I look for some very good things to happen."

With Taylor in charge for the first time, the Raiders were 17-1 in the regular season last year with the only loss coming on tiebreaker criteria. The team then went 2-3 in the post season, advancing to the state duals tournament for the 8th consecutive year.

In all, eight full-time starters return from that team and so do a pair of wrestlers with extensive varsity experience. Throw in a pair of Grade A freshmen and the Raiders look to have all the holes filled with qualified applicants.

"I'm excited about this team. I really am. I think this team has a

ton of potential and they are a great bunch of kids to work with," Taylor said. "We'll need to stay healthy; but I think this team is capable of having a very good year. I'll stop short of making any predictions, but I will say we'll be working hard to get where we want to be at the end of the year."

In a vote by team members, Matthews was elected captain and Jamar Henry and Neal Engstrom are co-captains. Combined, they form the heart of the senior class that Coach Taylor pointed to. All three RHS captains are four-year starters.

When it comes to Matthews, there's not much left to write about that hasn't already been written. The Clarion recruit is a two-time state runner-up, a three-time state place-winner and carries a 135-16 career record.

"Austin has one goal, to win a state title," Taylor said. "For him, it really is that simple. His motto this year is: 'State title or bust.'"

Henry (182) will need to put together a strong season but could reach 100 career wins before he graduates. He's a three-year letterman with 60 career wins. He has been remarkably consistent with his improvement over the last three years and should that rise continue, he will be fighting for a spot at the state tournament.

Being named a co-captain will surely give a confidence

boost to Engstrom (126), who will have wrestled close to 200 varsity matches before his career ends but has a career record that hovers near. 500.

"Neal has the talent and the heart, if he can put those two together, he'll have a very good season," Taylor predicted. Engstrom is currently out of the lineup with an injury.

Senior Logan Rickert (220) is also a returning starter and will look to improve on his 16-17 record of one-year ago in which he lost a dozen or so matches by two points or less.

"Last year Logan was competitive, he was in almost every match he wrestled. This year we need him to step up and become one of our leaders," Taylor said. "He's a tremendous athlete and having that year of varsity experience is really going to help him."

The other seniors on the roster - Cam Cianci (138), Curtis Arnold (170), Matthew Leise (138) and Clay Stoyer (182) - all have previous varsity experience of varying degrees.


Cianci was a Regional qualifier as a freshman but he has missed

the last two seasons with injury. Arnold, Leise and Stoyer have all been inserted as spot starters.

Leise and Cianci will go head-to-head for the starting spot at 138 pounds. Leise has spent much of his career behind elite wrestlers like Adam Matthews, Mason Beckman and Dylan D'Urso. Coach Taylor called the Leise vs. Cianci wrestle-off the team's "most competitive."

Stoyer is currently rehabbing his knee from a football injury and is not expected to compete though he wanted to maintain his presence on the team. Stoyer will structure his rehab program toward the track and field season where he is a returning PIAA qualifier in the intermediate hurdles.

Among the junior class, there is a trio of returning starters: Mason McCollum (132), Austin Moffett (170) and Alex DiGregorio (126) while a fourth - Levi Stoyer

(145) - saw considerable mat time, as well.

McCollum, with 65 career wins, is the most polished of the foursome but DiGregorio, Moffett and Levi Stoyer are amping up their game.

"McCollum made great strides in his technique last year but was still a little bit undersized physically," Taylor said. "He's matured (physically) in the off-season and I look for him to be greatly improved."

Stoyer has always been someone Taylor has had confidence in, but the problem has been finding the right weight class for him. Stoyer wrestled very well in the postseason last year at 152 pounds, and should be even stronger at 145 this year. The expectation is that he will excel.

Junior Robert Foulkrod starts the season on the injured list but will push for a starting spot at 285 when healthy. Classmates Kegan Miller (160), Denton Zeronas (195) and Trevor Griswold (195) all will battle for starting spots, while Tyler Gongloff will back Matthews at 152. Dustin McCurdy (160), Dominic Rimer (160) and Dallas Sposito (132) round out the juniors – the largest of the four classes with a dozen members.

Mike Bartolo (113) was the only Reynolds freshman to start last season but will be joined by at least two others to start this season - Nick Nottingham (120) and Mike Millero (160). Don't be surprised if Jake

Former Raiders Making Their Mark

As we gear up for the start of the high school wrestling season, the college season has already had a lot of competitions. Several Reynolds alumni are competing in the college ranks this year, and they've all had their share of success in the early season. Below is a rundown of how they've been faring:

At Thiel College, both **Will Ringer ('09)** and the man who succeeded him at RHS, **Blake Heim ('12)**, are competing at 285 pounds. They have split time as starter for the Tomcats in a field that includes six other heavyweights. Ringer, a senior, commenced his season at the Washington & Jefferson Invitational, where he won four bouts before being forced to withdrawal from the tourney. He was also victorious in duals against Seton Hill and Gettysburg, and went 2-2 at the Ohio Northern Invite.

Heim started his college career on a high note, placing third at the Ithaca Invitational then following that up with a dual victory in overtime against Lycoming College. He had a quick fall against Muskingum and continued his strong season with a seventh place finish (4-2) at Ohio Northern.

Thiel's next action comes Friday night (Dec. 7) at home against Mt. Union.

Mercyhurst also has two for-

mer Raiders on their squad in brothers **Tony ('09)** and **Dylan ('12) D'Urso**. Tony took part in two early season tournaments as he finished with a 4-2 mark, good enough for fifth place at the Laker Open; and went 3-2,

falling one round away from hardware at the Ohio Northern Invite. Tony is a senior competing at 149 pounds. Dylan started his collegiate career off in style winning his first eight bouts and claiming tourney titles at the Washington & Jefferson Invite and the Laker Open. His early season success was rewarded as he was named PSAC Wrestler of the Week on November 19th.

Mercyhurst next competes at the PSAC Championships at Kutztown on Saturday (Dec. 8).

Luke Taylor ('10), a junior at the Coast Guard Academy, has been racking up the pins in the early going. Luke went 5-1, with three pins at the Messiah College Invite, finishing third. He accumulated three more pins at the East Stroudsburg Open, before falling just short of medaling. Taylor then advanced to the finals of the York invitational, finishing second.

CGA wrestles Roger Williams this week and then breaks until Jan. 11 when it wrestles at the Bud Whitehall Duals.

Off the mat, Taylor's cauliflower ear made an appearance on ESPN, when the popular Mike and Mike in the Morning radio/television program filmed a special Veteran's Day show on the Coast Guard campus. (Photos on The Back Page)

Probably the most impressive performance has come from Lehigh's **Mason Beckman ('11)**. Beckman is currently redshirting for the Mountain Hawks, but has competed in several open tournaments. He has claimed titles at the Binghamton Open, East Stroudsburg Open and Nittany Lion Open. He owns a victory over Jimmy Gulibon at each event. Gulibon was one the nation's top recruits and was a four-time Pennsylvania State Champion for Derry Area. Lehigh's website lists Beckman at 17-0, and he has yet to give up an offensive point.

And finally, Clint Morrison, son of former Raider **Tim Morrison ('82)**, is in his sophomore year at Rider. He has garnered a third place finish at the Binghamton Open and a sixth at the Keystone Classic. He also bagged dual wins against Shippensburg and Lock Haven.

Stoyer (195) or James Slater (160) show up in the lineup at some point, as both are in the mix.

Bartolo burst onto the scene last year and became a Regional semifinalist, just missing out on a trip to the state tournament while his 31 wins ranked him among the team leaders. He will be Coach Taylor's go-to guy at the bottom of the lineup.

Millero is an intriguing athlete who had a breakout season on the football field rushing for 1,291 yards. He seems primed to have that same kind of success on the wrestling mat.

Said Taylor, "he's about as athletic as you can get ... mobile and strong. He's a hard-nosed kid that won't back down."

There are just three freshmen on the high school roster but two will have to cut their teeth quickly as bookends Seth Hogue (106) and Gene Ringer (285) are opening day starters. The other freshman is lightweight Alex Reiter.

Hogue and Ringer are accomplished junior high wrestlers and both will need to adapt to the rigors of the varsity team quickly.

"Seth and Gene are both very

talented individuals," Taylor said. "I believe they both are going to have very successful careers."

Injuries have been a problem for the Raiders in the preseason. Having already lost Clay Stoyer for the year, the Raiders have also seen Engstrom, Cianci, Bartolo, Sposito and Foulkrod miss significant practice time.

"We've sort of been forced to take a deep breath with all the injuries," Taylor said, noting that none of the injuries are expected to be season-ending. "We're going to be fine; but it may take us a couple of weeks to get our best team on the mat."



Patience is not one of Taylor's most-polished virtues, but he is working on it.

"The big thing is for us is to just continue moving forward and to not get caught up in what does or doesn't happen in the first week or two," Taylor said, closing, "We're going to be just fine."

The Raiders open the season Dec. 7 & 8 at the high-octane Ironman Tournament. They follow that up with the dual match opener vs. powerful McDowell on Tuesday, Dec. 11. The Raiders' home opener is Jan. 2 against D-10 rival Fort LeBoeuf.

One word that speaks volumes about a young team that is growing up, maturing and finding its footing in the rough and tumble world that is high school wrestling.


As Reynolds fans, we are excited about the future. Most who follow the program closely understand that there is considerable talent coming down the

Matthews Named Outstanding Wrestler at King of the Mountain Tournament

Henry Finishes 5th and Rickert 7th

MILL HALL, Pa.— One year after winning a controversial King of the Mountain championship, RHS senior Austin Matthews (152) turned in a dominating performance and was named the event's Most Outstanding Wrestler.


"Austin went to KOM with one goal, and that was to win it," said coach Casey Taylor. "Being awarded the Outstanding Wrestler was very much deserved. He is coming into his own as a great captain that is leading by example with hard work and dedication to the team."

Seniors Jamar Henry and Logan Rickert also returned from KOM with


medals. Henry finished 5th at 182 and Rickert was 7th at 220. Rickert stepped up his game and recorded four falls.

A trio of Raiders came up one match short of placement—Matthew Leise (138), Levi Stoyer (145) and Gene Ringer (285). At KOM, Stoyer and Ringer both lost to defending PIAA state champions.

Nick Nottingham (120) picked up a WBF for his first varsity win and Mason McCollum (132) and Austin Moffett (170) also won matches. The Raiders' other entries were Seth Hogue (106), Kegan Miller (160), who was subbing for the injured Mike Millero, and Denton Zeronas (195). The Raiders did not have tournament entries at 113 and 126.

Heim Grabs PAC Honors, Bodo Named to PA Hall

There's a lot of good news to report from the month of December, as all of the RHS alumni competing collegiately have had success. It was also recently announced that another Reynolds alum will soon become a member of the PWCA Hall of Fame.

At Thiel College, **Will Ringer ('09)** and **Blake Heim ('12)** continue to share time at heavyweight. Heim got the nod for the Mt. Union dual and he did not disappoint. He disposed of Nick Terifaj in just 48 seconds, using his patented headlock. Terifaj entered the bout ranked 7th in the country. The performance led to Blake being named the PAC wrestler of the week on December 10th.

Ringer started the next dual against Washington & Jefferson, and had similar results, also picking up a fall. D3wrestle.com lists Will as a contender in their national rankings.

Thiel will return to the mats on Jan. 11 in Williamsport, Pa. as they attend the Bud Whitehall Duals at Lycoming College.

Dylan D'Urso ('12) continues to impress during his freshman campaign at Mercyhurst. Dylan finished 4th at the PSAC championships, with his only losses coming to highly regarded Division I wrestlers. Dylan followed that up with back-to-back technical falls in duals against East Stroudsburg and Mercyhurst Northeast.

Dylan's older brother **Tony D'Urso ('09)** was also successful in the Mercyhurst Northeast dual, scoring a decision over Matt Ostrander, raising his season mark to 10-6.

Mercyhurst next competes January 5th at Seton Hill.

The Coast Guard Academy closed out 2012 with a dual against Roger Williams, in which **Luke Taylor ('10)** scored a 4-1 decision over Joe DiBurro.

Luke will get to see a couple former RHS teammates as CGA joins Thiel at the Bud Whitehall Duals on Jan. 11.

Mason Beckman ('11) continued his strong red-shirt year at Lehigh as he placed 4th at the prestigious Midlands Championships held at North-

western. Beckman entered the tourney seeded 6th and both of his losses came to Tyler Graff, who is a two-time all-American and a two-time Midlands Champion. Beckman was able knock off Central Michigan's two-time all-American Scott Sentes who entered the tournament as the top seed and the No. 3 wrestler in the country.

Clint Morrison, son of former Raider **Tim Morrison ('78)**, joined Beckman at the Midlands Championships. Morrison, who was returning to the mat after missing some time with a concussion, went 2-2 in the event.

In other exciting news, Reynolds legend **Mark Bodo ('93)** has been selected as a member of the Class of 2013 for the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Mark was a three-time state place winner at Reynolds, capping his brilliant 137-21 career with a state championship in 1993. He then went on to become a three-time all-American at the University of Pittsburgh.

The induction ceremonies will take place on May 19 at the Ramada Inn in State College. Congratulations Mark!

Raiders Find Their Mojo at Manheim

Finish 3rd as a Team with 10 Place-Winners

MANHEIM, Pa.— Austin Matthews won his third Manheim Lions Holiday tournament title, his second straight Outstanding Wrestler award of the season and recorded the 150th win of his high school career. But what made Manheim really special is that Matthews was not a one-man band, as the Raiders turned in their finest performance of the young season and brought home 10 medals.

Mike Bartolo (113) also won an individual title and Seth Hogue (106) and Logan Rickert (220) battled their way to the finals as the Raiders made some serious hay in Pennsylvania Dutch Country. Both Bartolo and Hogue were unseeded but shocked their brackets by advancing to the finals.

“I’d like to start by saying I’m proud of our guys. From start to finish they wrestled with heart and that’s what we ask of them,” said Coach Casey Taylor. “Ten place-winners, all in the Top 5, that’s pretty special.”

Levi Stoyer (145) checked out with a fourth-place medal while Nick Nottingham (120), Mason McCollum (132), Curtis Arnold (160), Jamar Henry (182) and Gene Ringer (285) all finished fifth.

CUYAHOGA FALLS, Ohio—Freshman Gene Ringer hit a home run in his high school debut and senior Austin Matthews finished in the top three for a second straight season as the Reynolds Raiders began the 2012-13 season at the Walsh Ironman.

Don Cooley was named head wrestling coach at Mars High School two years after Glenn Clark was killed by a drunk driver. Still months away from wrestling season, but eager to start this new position, Coach Cooley began sifting through the wrestling gear, taking inventory of uniforms and such.

On the top shelf of the wrestling coaches' locker in an old, worn out cardboard box, Cooley found a headgear. Scribbled on a piece of athletic tape inside one of the ear guards were two words. "Coach Clark." Cooley couldn't resist.

"I put the headgear on and snapped up the chinstrap," Cooley said. "It fit me perfect, just like it was my own."

And then, something remarkable happened.

"Every hair on the back of my neck stood up... then on my arms. It was one of the most amazing experiences of my life," Cooley said. "Even though I never met Glenn, it was like he was

right there with me."

The Glenn Clark Memorial Tournament was held on Sunday, Jan. 20th. At Mars, Glenn Clark is a bit of a legend, remembered as the man most responsible for starting the wrestling program.




My personal history with Glenn runs deep. At RHS, Glenn and I were pals. Football players and wrestlers we were. In football we played the same position and in wrestling many times eliminated at the same weight, and even though I was one year older, it seemed we were always bumping heads.

Glenn was a great competitor, absolutely hated losing, but off the mat and off the field, he was a guy with a great

personality who loved laughing and having a good time—just like me.

And so, it was awesome to see so many Reynolds entries at the Glenn Clark tournament. I realize that for many, the Glenn Clark event is just another tournament, another stop along the trail to wrestling success. And that's okay. But for me, it will never be just another event; it will always be a special day with an opportunity to tell anyone who will listen that Glenn Clark was my friend.

Raiders Earn Top Seed for District 10 Duals

By virtue of victories over Fort LeBoeuf and Saegertown, the Region I champion Reynolds Raiders have earned the No. 1 seed for the District 10 Team Duals Championships.

Hershey, PA is billed as the “Sweetest Place on Earth,” but for Reynolds Wrestling fans, it’s more than that. It’s our second home.

For the seventh time in the last nine seasons, the Reynolds Raiders returned home from the PIAA Class AA Team Championships carrying some hardware. The Raiders concluded a 6-1 postseason by finishing second at the 2013 tournament.

The Raiders were defeated in the state finals by powerful Bethlehem Catholic, the winner of three straight Class AA titles.

En route to the finals, the Raiders were impressive, defeating Saucon Valley, 35-29, West Branch, 45-19, and Boiling Springs, 31-20. The Raiders earned a favorable spot in the PIAA bracket by beating Fort LeBoeuf one week earlier to win the school’s 11th District 10 Team Duals title.

The Raiders were tested by Saucon Valley and trailed 29-25 with two matches remaining but freshmen Gene Ringer (285) and Seth Hogue (106) racked up 10 points with a fall and major decision.



The team wrestled much better on Friday and disposed of West Branch handily before knocking off nemesis Boiling Springs, a team that had beaten RHS in the last two state duals tourneys.

In the finals, Becahi proved too much for the Raiders as the team managed just four wins against the three-timers. Austin Matthews (152) had the lone pin for RHS while Logan Rickert (220) added a major decision. Mike Bartolo (113), who opened the match, and Levi Stoyer (145) were the other Raiders to score wins.

Reynolds was 15-2 in the regular season and closed out the dual match season with a 21-3 mark. It was Reynolds’ first PIAA medal since 2010, and the second for this year’s senior class.

"It was an incredible and heart-warming experience to recognize these kids," Taylor said. "We all wanted to show the academy's support for this tragedy, and we felt the best way to do

so, was to invite them to our home dual meet and start the night off with an elementary dual. They lived the dream of competing under the spotlight."

"Newtown is a strong-knit community that loves their wrestling program just like we love our Reynolds program," Taylor said. "My heart goes out to all of those kids and I'm glad we were able to have an impact on their lives by hosting them at the Coast Guard Academy."

By the way, Newtown was victorious in five of the six bouts wrestled.

Luke, meanwhile, was hampered by injuries for much of February, leaving him unable to compete. He has healed at the right time, however, as the medical staff has cleared him in time to wrestle at the Northeast Regional tournament where the top three finishers in each weight class qualify for the NCAA tournament. Luke narrowly missed a trip to "the show" last sea-

son. He promises to wear a Reynolds Wrestling T-shirt under his CGA warm-ups, which will clearly give him an advantage.

The trio of RHS alum that are wrestling at Thiel College all continued their impressive seasons during February.

Will Ringer ('09) and Adam Matthews ('11) both placed at the Baldwin and Wallace Invite. Ringer placed 4th in the Heavyweight class with a 3-2 record, while Matthews was third at 141, going 4-1. Ringer and Matthews again shined at the PAC championships, with both winning their respective weight classes. Matthews dominated the 141-pound field winning by fall and major decision. Ringer had to come back from an early deficit in his finals match, winning 4-2. It was Ringer's second PAC title.

Blake Heim ('12) got in on the action at a quad meet at Case Western Reserve. Blake went 2-0 pinning both

Raiders Take Down Bison, Win 11th D-10 Team Title

SHARON, Pa.—It could not have been more exciting.

Spurred by big wins from Nick Nottingham (120), Mason McCollum (126) and Austin Moffett (182), the Reynolds Raiders edged Fort LeBoeuf, 28-24, to win the school's 11th District 10 Team Duals title.

It was the eighth title in nine years for the Raiders, but the first for second-year head coach Casey Taylor.

"It was a total team effort," said Coach Taylor, summarizing the Duals. "I am really happy for the kids; they worked hard to regain the District title. We have achieved one of our major goals for the season; but there are some more goals to reach, and I am sure they will be ready to get back to work."

Reynolds advanced to the finals with a 61-9 win over Seneca, and a 35-22 triumph over Saegertown.

Eight Raiders scored falls in the win over Seneca and two more added tech falls. Against Saegertown, Logan Rickert (220) and Austin Matthews (152) had pins and Mike Bartolo (113) and Levi Stoyer (145) contributed bonus points with major decisions.

Reynolds has been the common denominator since the team duals concept began in 1999. The Raiders have appeared in all 15 championship matches with an impressive 11-4 record in those bouts. Reynolds has never lost in the semifinals or in the opening round and is 28-4 in all D-10 duals matches wrestled.

Reynolds won the team standings with 202 points. Franklin finished a distant second with 93.5 points and Mercer had 93.

his opponents. Matthews was also 2-0 and Ringer won his lone bout, as Thiel swept the event as a team. Matthews, Heim, and Ringer's respective season records are: 16-1, 19-8, and 16-6. Matthews is unbeaten against D-III competition. Next up, Thiel will wrestle at the Mideast Regional where the top three placers earn an automatic bid to nationals.

Mercyhurst's **Tony D'Urso ('09)** finished his college career with a win.

Tony was honored at senior night before he Pitt-Johnstown dual, and he responded with a 5-4 victory. Tony finished his senior season at 11-6.

Tony's younger brother, **Dylan D'Urso ('12)**, has continued to show that he had very little adjusting to do at the college level. Dylan started the month off by upsetting a couple of nationally ranked wrestlers. He beat Pitt-Johnstown's Dave Fogel 4-2, and Gannon's Jose Matos 8-2. The latter helped propel Mercyhurst to a win over Gannon for their first ever conference title. Dylan then went 3-0 at the Lake Erie Quad and went 4-1 at the Super Region I tour-

nament, where his runner-up finish qualified him for the Division II National Championships March 8-9 in Birmingham, AL. Dylan dropped his final bout to Cameron Throckmorton of Shippensburg, snapping a string of 19 straight victories. Dylan does own a December win against Throckmorton.

D'Urso (29-4) will open nationals with a preliminary bout against 7th ranked Alphonse Vruno of Minnesota State-Mankato.

Dylan said that he's, "hoping to put it together for one more weekend to earn a spot on the podium and turn some heads around the country."

Mason Beckman ('11) finished up his redshirt year with a very impressive 39-4 record. Mason's only losses came against Minnesota's Tyler Graff (ranked 3rd in the nation) and Mark Grey (whom he's also defeated). Mason wrestled in two February tournaments, placing second in the Edinboro Open and third in the National Collegiate Open. In his final bout of the National Collegiate Open, Mason pinned four-time PIAA champion Jimmy Gulibon. It marks Mason's fourth victory over Gulibon this season. Look for Mason to return to Lehigh's starting lineup next season.



Matthews Gets His Gold

Senior Snares Reynolds' 24th State Title

HERSHEY— Austin Matthews completed his exquisite work at Reynolds High School by winning the 152-pound state championship at the 2013 PIAA Class AA Wrestling Championships.

It was the final stroke on a remarkable masterpiece that Matthews has crafted over the last four seasons. For Matthews, who had finished second the two previous seasons, winning a state title gives him the freedom

to truly appreciate the full spectrum of his high school career.

Matthews was one of three Raiders to earn medals at Hershey and one of five RHS state qualifiers.

Senior Jamar Henry (182) and junior Levi Stoyer

both finished seventh for the Raiders while Seth Hogue (106) and Mike Bartolo (113) were the other qualifiers.

As a team, the Raiders finished in 10th place to extend a streak of Top 10 finishes to at least 16 seasons.

"It's a good thing Austin won, because I don't know what I would have said to him if he had lost. I'm a big believer that hard work pays off and Austin is certainly living proof of that."



Matthews, who finished the season with a 49-1 record, rolled through the opening round with a tech fall and then added a decision in the quarterfinals. In the semifinals, Matthews was again dominant with a ma-

D'Urso Snare National Award

The Reynolds Wrestling alumni recently wrapped up a highly successful 2012-13 season. Several matmen finished with high win-totals, as well as conference and even national hardware. The future looks bright as only two of the group graduate this year (Will Ringer and Tony D'Urso), and at least three more (Austin Matthews – Clarion University, and Cam Cianci and Jamar Henry – Mercyhurst North East) are planning to continue their wrestling careers next year.

Dylan D'Urso ('12) arguably enjoyed the most success this season. Dylan advanced to the D-II national tournament, where he sandwiched a convincing win in between two very tough losses. Dylan dropped a sudden victory decision in the tourney's first round, and suffered a 4-3 setback in the second round of consolations. Both wrestlers who defeated Dylan earned All-American status, finishing 3rd and 4th respectively. However, Dylan did not leave Alabama without hardware as he earned an award for leading the nation in wins by technical fall.

Dylan's 11 tech falls also shattered Mercyhurst's single season record, which previously stood at four. He also broke the school's record for most 3-point near-falls in a season, with 41; and his 30 wins rank as the fourth most by a freshman in school history. D'Urso finished his rookie campaign with a 30-6 record.

Dylan's older brother, **Tony D'Urso ('09)**, was honored with an All-Academic 2nd team selection. Tony holds a very impressive 3.94 GPA and was recently accepted into Mercyhurst's School of Pharmacy.

Luke Taylor ('10) of the Coast Guard Academy, battled injuries for a good portion of the season, but appeared to be getting healthy at the right time. Luke wrestled a phenomenal tournament at the D-III Northeast Regional, advancing to the semi-finals, before he was defeated by the eventual national runner-up. Luke was anxious to get back on the mat, as the top three advanced to the NCAA tournament. However, the medical and coaching staffs held Luke out of further competition for fear that he may have broken ribs. He had already wrestled well enough for a sixth place finish. Fortunately, the X-rays came back negative.

Luke was later named first team All Pilgrim League at 174 pounds. He finished his junior season with a 21-9 record.

Thiel's **Adam Matthews ('11)** enjoyed a successful return to the mat after taking a year off and transferring in from NC State. Adam picked up three pins at the Mideast Regional Tournament and finished in sixth place. He finished the season with a strong 19-4 ledger.

Will Ringer ('09) dropped two decisions at the regional tournament, finishing his senior year with a 16-8 record. Will won 42 matches in his career and was a 2-time PAC champion.

ior decision.

A takedown 10 seconds into the state finals match gave Matthews an early advantage over Coudersport's Kyle Bova—one that he would not relinquish as worked his way to a 4-2 win.

"You cannot replace a wrestler like Austin," said Coach Casey Taylor. "On the mat, as a role model, or as a leader. He is a tremendous young man with a great gift."

"He has left behind giant shoes to fill but also the work ethic he instilled in his teammates that will hopefully carry on to next year's team and beyond. That is part of the Raider tradition, to give the team more than you take from it.

"To me, Austin is a coach's dream and a child's hero," Taylor said.

Matthews closes his high school career as Reynolds 24th' state champion. He is a four-time Section, District and Regional champion and a four-time state place-winner. With 184 career wins, he is second on the all-time RHS win list behind only Mason Beckman (196).

Henry's medal capped a solid high school career that saw him win 96 career matches.

He was 3-2 at the state tournament, pushing his season record to 37-12. He won his final match, 8-6, over Garrett Wesnewski of Canton to finish 7th.

Henry, who will wrestle at Mer-

cyhurst/North East, closes his high school career as a three-time Section champion, which is a remarkable accomplishment for a wrestler who was 7-19 as a freshman.

"Jamar's medal is a product of hard work and determination," Taylor said.

"His career is probably best defined by the phrase 'never give up.' It would have been easy for Jamar to accept the fact that he could have been average; instead, he dedicated himself to the team and set high goals. I am so proud of Jamar and all his accomplishments."

Reynolds' third state medalist, Stoyer, had an amazing postseason



run, winning Section, District and Regional crowns.

Though he was not a full-time starter as a sophomore and did not have a winning record, Stoyer (145) made up for lost time during his junior campaign, closing out the year with an overall record of 42-8. From start to finish, he was one of the team's most-consistent performers.

At states, Stoyer was 3-2, winning 5-2 over Briton Shelton of Bermudian Springs in the 7th place consolation final.

"I think a lot of people would look and say that Austin Matthews really helped make Levi a good wrestler, and that's true," said Taylor. "But what people don't realize is that Levi helped make Austin, too. They have worked out a lot together the last two seasons and they have improved together. This year that improvement really came evident.

If you simply look at the standings and the scores, a reasonable person would conclude that it was another highly successful season of Reynolds Wrestling.

A state champion, the PIAA Dual Match 2nd place team, Section, District and Regional team championships ... there is a lot to be proud of. There is no arguing the results or the statistics, they stand on their own merits and add a riveting chapter to the Reynolds Wrestling history book.

You won't find this stat on the Reynolds Wrestling website, but I'd be willing to wager that the Raiders set a new record this season: Most Hugs.



It stretches beyond the wrestling mat, beyond the statistics and into the hearts and minds of the families. It's real. And this season it was so real you could touch it. Maybe better stated as it touched me. At the end of the day, I know this: you won't find it anywhere else. I've looked.

I talked with Shari before the Friday night match at Hershey. We talked about how losing to Boiling Springs would make us all feel like we had just been to another funeral. At that point, a "good" showing was not good enough. Right then, we all needed a little boost. The team surely didn't hear our conversation, but they responded like they did.

At Sharon, I hugged Elaine and we talked about what a beautiful distraction this season had been for her and for her family. Matthews Wins 4th Straight Individual Championship

Raiders Claim Regional Team Title

SHARON — Austin Matthews won his fourth straight individual title and helped the Raiders to the team championship, as RHS fought back strong challenges from Fort LeBoeuf, Brookville, Saegertown and Redbank Valley.

The Raiders sent 11 wrestlers to Regionals and five earned the right to advance to the state tournament.

Levi Stoyer (145) joined Matthews (152) as a Regional champion, while Jamar Henry (182) finished second and Seth Hogue (106) and Mike Bartolo (113) were third. Matthews joins a short list of four-time Regional champions that includes Matt Dunn, Mason Beckman and Dylan D'Urso. He dominated, out-scoring his three opponents, 36-9. Stoyer, meanwhile, was tested en route to his title, but won a pair of overtime matches and a 3-2 decision in the finals.

“We did not win the team title last season and that’s something that we really wanted to get back,” said Coach Casey Taylor. “The kids really wrestled well ... winning the team title is a real testament to their efforts.”

Senior Logan Rickert (220) just missed a trip to states, losing in the consolation finals by a score of 1-0. Rickert closed his season with a 35-12 record. Gene Ringer (285) won three matches to finish his freshman season with a 34-19 mark. He was impressive.

Sophomore Mike Millero (160) also wrestled well, winning a pair of matches while seniors Cam Cianci (132), Matthew Leise (138) and junior Mason McCollum all won a match.

“Everyone contributed,” said Taylor. “At the end of the tournament of this caliber, as a coach, that’s what you want to be able to say.”

“I’m so proud of the effort of all of our kids, not just the ones who got out,” Taylor added. “They came ready to wrestle and they battled ... and that’s what we ask them to do. This is a great group of kids, I’m very proud of every one of them.”





Wrestling Classic
