TIME TO

RELOAD

the Raiders

If you still have that old T-shirt that says “Reynolds doesn’t rebuild, they reload,” this would be a pretty good time to run it through the ol’ washing machine.

In terms of the upcoming wrestling season, I think the reloading analogy works pretty well. Certainly, a new round of firepower has arrived. The Raiders are locked and loaded and our steady eye has never wavered from the target. Yes indeed, the reloading process has begun.

As we begin the new season, expectation levels are high for a team that is young, but boasts considerable talent at nearly every weight class. To put it another way, it is a very good time to be a fan of Reynolds Wrestling.

THIRD YEAR’S A CHARM - Casey Taylor enters his third season as the Raiders’ head coach with a regular season coaching mark of 31-3, 40-7 overall. For comparison sake, Brian Hills was 25-6-1, Mark Reichard 24-

3-1, Neal Lineman 19-4, and Ed McClimans 22-8 after their first two seasons. Bear in mind that it’s hard to compare coaches from different eras because the post season duals format did not exist when Hills, McClimans, Reichard and Lineman began their tenures. That is a significant variable. So is strength of schedule which once consisted of only local teams. To make it as fair as possible, the chart below consists only of regular season results.

Truth be told, I think Coach Taylor is probably a little ahead of where I thought he’d be. The consensus was that it may take him a year or two to settle into his role and find his niche. It did not, and he has been impressive since day one.

In case you’re wondering, it took Coach Lineman five years to get his first unbeaten team and it took Coach Hills six seasons. I mention that only because unbeaten seasons are always the goal at RHS, and certainly something Coach Taylor will be striving for with this year’s squad.

The Young & Restless

Nearly half of the Raiders' starting lineup could be made up of freshmen and sophomores, but don't let that fool you; these kids are talented, experienced and ready to start the season

It's easy to understand why Casey Taylor begins his third season as the Reynolds wrestling coach with an extraordinary amount of enthusiasm.

Not only does Taylor's team return 10 lettermen, he also has at his disposal an arsenal of extremely talented freshmen - the kind of talented troop that shows up about once every decade. If Taylor can balance that youthful energy with the experience and grit of his upperclassmen, it will lead to another exciting chapter in the Reynolds Wrestling chronicles.

Last year's entry was especially riveting as the Raiders overcame adversity time and time again to

compile a 21-3 dual-match record and finish second at the Class AA Team Duals. Austin Matthews, now wrestling at Clarion University, capped off the memorable run by becoming the Raiders' 24th state champion.

To repeat that kind of success, Reynolds will first look to its senior class, one of the largest in recent memory. Make no mistake; it is the seniors' responsibility to carry on the Raider tradition.

"This year's senior class includes 11 members that have quite a bit of experience," Taylor said. "Five of them are returning lettermen and it is important that they hit the ground running for us to have success. These young men are doing a good job of demonstrating the kind of work ethic that we look for."

Levi Stoyer, Mason McCollum, Austin Moffett and Alex DiGregorio have all won multiple varsity letters and Denton Zeronas picked up his first last year. Trevor Griswold, Robert Foulkrod, Kegan Miller, Tyler Gongloff, Dustin McCurdy, and Alex McWherter are the other seniors.

After winning just 12 matches in his freshman and sophomore years combined, Stoyer shined in his first year as a full-time starter rolling all the way to medal at the PIAA Championships. His turn-around was nothing short of amazing, posting a 42-8 mark as a junior after going 8-13 as a sophomore.

"Levi showed us exactly what we believed he had," Taylor said. "He

developed a mental toughness that was necessary for him to put the pieces of the puzzle together. The coaching staff is going to continue to encourage him to raise the bar every time he steps on the mat with the ultimate goal of standing on top of the medal stand in Hershey.”

McCollum has been a model of consistency for the Raiders, winning 30, 30 and 28 matches in his first three seasons. He finds himself just a dozen wins short of the century mark, and should quickly become the 31st wrestler to win 100 matches at RHS.

“Mason has made probably the most notable progress in the off season. He set his sights on the weight room and is entering the season as a full-fledged, 152-pounder,” Taylor said. “We have highlighted a few areas for Mason to work on in order to cross the threshold and become a state qualifier. We firmly believe that he can be a part of the tradition of Reynolds wrestlers that finish their career with a PIAA medal.”

Though he has earned a bit of a reputation of bumping up and doing well against bigger and stronger kids, Moffett will drop a weight class and could fit into the starting lineup at 160 pounds. He ranks fourth among active RHS wrestlers with 53 wins.

Miller also has his sights on the 160 pound slot and although he has yet to crack the varsity lineup he is an authentic talent and has been wrestling extremely well in the practice room. Likewise, Gongloff is also capable of working his way into the lineup, having performed very well on the junior varsity stage.

Zeronas came up just short of a .500 record last year at 195 pounds and that experience should help propel him to more victories this season.

DiGregorio missed nearly all of last season after being disciplined for a violation of team rules, but he returns with a new focus and solid experience, having won 36 matches and a pair of letters. He is the expected starter at 138 pounds.

Foulkrod is a wrestler that has not

Brian Hills Headed to PA Hall of Fame

Legendary Reynolds Wrestler and Coach Joins Lineman, Taylor & Bodo

Brian Hills will become the fourth Reynolds Raider inducted into the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches' Association Hall of Fame as part of the Class of 2014. For those who followed his career, this announcement was inevitable.

Though he will tell you that he loved playing football just as much as wrestling, it is on the mat where Hills made his greatest mark. As a youngster, he won a pair of Junior Olympic state titles. In high school at Reynolds, he excelled, going 81-9-1 over a four-year career while finishing second in the state at 167 pounds in 1975.

Thiel College was his next stop and the success continued as he twice qualified for the NCAA Division III National Championships. Though his athletic career alone would make him a candidate worthy of consideration, it is his coaching accolades that make him a no-brainer.

Taking over as the head coach at RHS in 1986-87, after running a highly successful Reynolds junior program, Hills immediately began a 25-year odyssey that reads more like a fairy tale than a history book. His statistics are mind boggling.

In two and a half decades, Hills' teams won 23 Section championships, 16 District 10 Championships, 15 Northwest Regional team titles and 5 PIAA Team Points championships. In addition, his teams also won 10 District 10 Team Duals titles and 3 PIAA Class

AA Team Duals titles. His teams finished either second or third at the state championships seven other times.

Twenty eight of his wrestlers reached the state finals with 17 winning titles. Included in that list are three-time champs Casey Taylor and Justin Nestor, and two-timers Jonathon Hazi and Mason Beckman.



In all, Hills led 78 wrestlers to state medals, averaging more than 3 per year over his 25 seasons. In addition, he coached 128 Section champions, 78 District, and 53 Northwest Regional titlists. His dual match teams won 370 of the 410 matches they wrestled. He finished his career with a coaching record of 370-39-1.

Hills was named the PIAA Class AA Coach of the Year on three occasions – 1992, 1998 and 2006, and he won the D-10 Coach of the Year 7 times. In 2006, he was honored as the National Wrestling Coaches Association Region 2 Coach of the Year, an honor which encompasses the northeast corner of the US. Previously, Coach Hills was inducted into the Reynolds High School, Thiel College and Mercer County hall of fames.

Raiders Thriving at the Next Level

The college wrestling season is off to an early and exciting start.

Mason Beckman ('11), coming off a stellar red-shirt year and tough offseason training regimen that had him working out in Tokyo at Japan's national training center, was selected to compete in the NWCA All-Star Classic. Beckman was paired against AJ Schopp of Edinboro in the exhibition. Schopp entered the event ranked 4th in the nation, but on the strength of two takedowns, Mason rolled to a 5-1 victory.

Officially, Beckman owns a 7-0 record and the sixth spot in the national Division I rankings. Five of his wins have come against other ranked opponents: #12 Nick Wilcox of Bloomsburg (2-0), #11 Jimmy Gulibon of Penn State (7-6), #13 Joe Roth of Central Michigan (2-1), #17 Shelton Mack of Pitt (5-3), and #19 Joe Martinez of Virginia (4-2). At the Northeast Duals in Albany, NY this past weekend, Beckman went 3-0 to help his school to three

straight wins, including an impressive win over No. 11 Virginia.

"The biggest success today was as a team," Beckman said following the Northeast Duals. "Three wins against three very good teams. Every match has shown improvement and it's nice to see our guys having fun."

Entering is senior season with the United States Coast Guard Academy, **Luke Taylor ('10)**, has been named captain for the second straight season. Luke opened his season at the Messiah Invitational where he posted two convincing wins before being injured in a semi-final loss. He was forced to default from the event, but hopes to compete again this season.

Dylan D'Urso ('12) has moved up from the weight class where he qualified for nationals last year to

141 pounds. Dylan advanced to the finals of his first completion (Laker Open) at his new weight class on the strength of two major decisions and a fall. In the finals he dropped a decision to West Virginia's Colin Johnston. D'Urso has since reeled off four straight convincing victories – three technical falls and a pin. Mercyhurst will compete at the PSAC Championships in Edinboro on Dec. 7.

Thiel College's **Blake Heim ('12)** has enjoyed early season success that includes a runner-up finish at the Washington & Jefferson Invitational. Blake is currently 6-2 with four wins coming by fall. Both of his losses were by decision. Thiel next wrestles at the Ohio Northern Invitational on Dec. 7.

Austin Matthews ('13), a 2013 PA state champion, made his much anticipated college debut for Clarion at the Eastern Michigan University Duals. Austin went 3-1 with a major decision, technical fall, and a pin. His only loss came by decision against Northern Illinois's 12th

gotten a lot of attention, but in an effort to make the lineup he has trimmed down to 220 pounds, after serving as the backup to heavyweight's Blake Heim and Gene Ringer the last three years. Foulkrod's experience and maturity give him the inside track to the starting job.

Griswold (182) is another senior who is likely to show up in the starting lineup on opening night. He was used just once last season in a varsity bout, but

McCurdy is currently sidelined with a knee injury and McWherter, nicknamed "The Tank" on the football field, is a first-year wrestler.

Returning state qualifier Mike Bartolo heads up the junior class which also includes returning start-

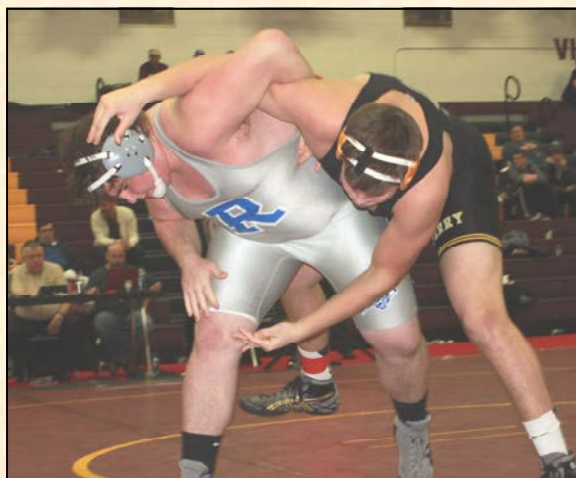

ers Mike Millero and Nick Nottingham. Other juniors are Jake Stoyer, James Slater and Ryan Zeronas.

Bartolo (126) has won 61 matches his first two seasons and is looking to add a little more consistency to his game. His win total would have been higher, but he missed the start of his sophomore season with an injury.

Millero (170) is on the verge of becoming one of the real stars of the team. He won 22 matches as a sophomore even though he missed nearly all of December with an injury. If Millero continues to improve at his current pace he will be a beast.

"I look forward to Bartolo and Millero showing that there impressive sophomore seasons were not a fluke," Taylor said. "These two young men are hungry for the action to kick off this season."

Because of the uncommonly high level of "never-say-die" in the veins of Nottingham, he became one of Raider Nation's favorite wrestlers last season. He'll have a battle on his hands to crack the lineup at either 132 or 138 pounds this year, but with his determination, he simply can't be counted out. In addition, his abilities give Taylor some options with his dual-match lineup card.

Stoyer, Slater and Ryan Zeronas will all press for varsity time, though they are not expected to start. All have strong jayvee pedigrees.

Last year's freshman class was small with just three members, but Seth Hogue (113) and Gene Ringer (285) grew into monster contributors very quickly. Hogue became a state qualifier and missed placing by one match, and Ringer stormed out of the gate with a medal at the Ironman ended up wrestling 53 matches, winning 34 of them.

"Our bookends of last year - Seth and Gene - are battle tested and understand what is expected of them coming into the season. Both of these young men are capable of leaving Hershey with some hardware," Taylor said. "The staff is encouraged by the dedication that Seth

made to the weight room and Gene has improved his offense in many ways that we hope will result in some very big wins throughout the season.”

Alec Reiter was the other freshman last year but he is joined by classmates Zach Huffman and Daniel Blayney. Huffman wrestled on the highly successful junior high team last year.

Freshmen Gage Bayless (106), Chaise Hauck (120) and Joel Leise (132) are looked at as favorites to start on opening night and Cole Rickert (220) is stalking a lineup spot, as well. Other freshmen on the roster include Andrew Osborne, Brik Bateman, Damion Gearhart and Ben Wilcox.

“On paper, this year’s freshmen class has as much *potential* as some of the all time great classes that we have had. They still have a lot to prove on the mat, but in the short time being on the varsity squad they have shown that they understand the amount of work that it will take to be very successful,” Taylor said. “The staff has already expressed to them that they are a key ingredient to the success of this year’s team; therefore, it is essential that they have a quick learning curve and wrestle with heart.”

Lastly, Coach Taylor was pleased to announce that former Raider Adam Matthews has been added to the varsity coaching staff. Matthews, a former PIAA runner-up and winner of 131 career matches, joins fellow assistants Joe Reichard, Michael Hills, Mark Bartolo and Marty Taylor in the Raiders’ coaching corner.

The Raiders are slated to open the season at home on Friday, Dec. 6. They will wrestle three-time defending District 10 Class AAA team champions McDowell on Tuesday, Dec. 10 before heading off to the Ironman Tournament on Dec. 13 and 14.

"Our team did well," Matthews said following his three wins in Albany. "Our team just keeps getting better and better every time out."

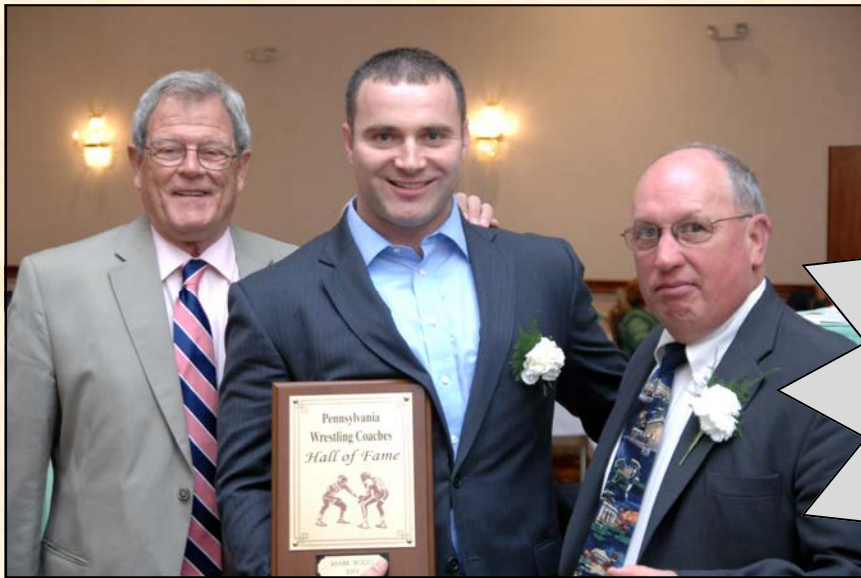

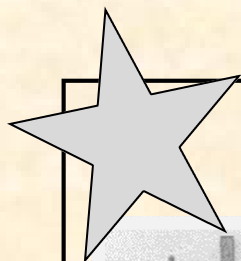


Mark Bodo Inducted into PA Wrestling Hall of Fame

On Sunday, May 19, 2013, Mark Bodo became the third Reynolds Raider to be inducted into the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches' Association Hall of Fame. Mark was a 1993 PIAA State Champion and a three-time state place-winner with a career record of 137-21. At the University of Pittsburgh, Mark was a three-time Division I All-American (placing 6th, 4th and 6th) and won 106 matches. He remains one of the most-successful wrestlers in RHS and Pitt history and joins coach Neal Lineman and wrestler Casey Taylor in the PWCA Hall of Fame. Brian Hills, Neal Lineman and Rick Stoyer attended the ceremony as did Mark's parents, Ernie and Karen Bodo.



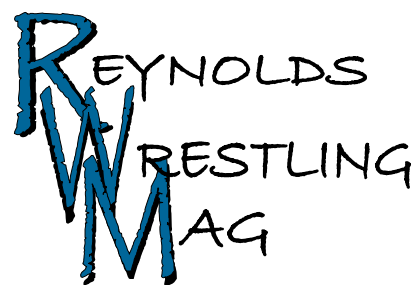

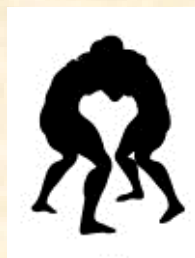
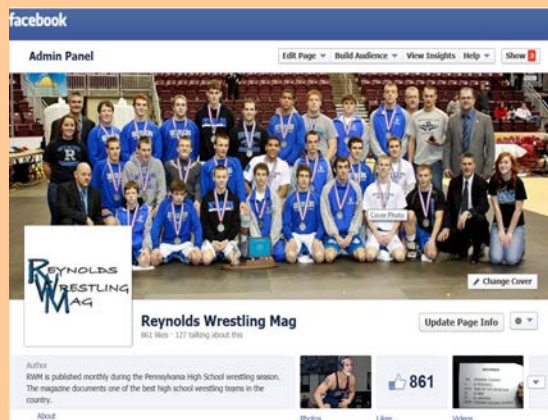

If I Ruled Reynolds Wrestling There Would Be Changes

I respect people who can look back at their lives and say they wouldn't change a thing. As for me, pfft, there are many things I wish I could go back and do over.

In the world of Reynolds Wrestling there are a couple of wrongs out there that I would love to see righted. Here's what started this whole train a-rolling:

A couple of years back Neal Lineman was kind enough to lend me the scrapbooks that his wife Mary had pieced together throughout his RHS coaching career. The books were full of news clippings, photographs and hand written cards and letters that Coach Lineman had accumulated through the years. One yellowed, coordinating scrapbook for each year he coached.

Those scrapbooks brought to life the seasons of Reynolds Wrestling that I had not seen with my own eyes. They were like candy to me. I devoured them, got hooked on them and learned so much.

For example, In 1967 Jim became the Raiders' first state champion. I already knew that, and that he had been a state runner-up in 1966; but I often wondered who beat Gollner in his state championship season because his name is not on the list of unbeaten Reynolds



wrestlers. Turns out no one beat Gollner that year, though he did tie in the dual match vs. Saegertown.

I totally respect Coach Lineman and understand that in those days the prevailing reasoning was "unbeaten and untied." You heard it a lot in sports, especially college football. But, in my mind, nobody beat Gollner. If I ruled Reynolds Wrestling, I'd put Gollner on the unbeaten list. I'd be okay with an asterisk if that helped get it done.

An even bigger injustice revolves around the Raiders' 60-plus match win streak that was snapped in 1975-76 over a teachers' strike. It's a vivid memory for me because I was at an impressionable age and my brother Doug was a senior on that team.

Snap a losing streak because of a forfeit? I don't think so. No way does that happen in a Don Shaffer controlled universe. To beat Reynolds, you must *beat* Reynolds. To me, that's a technicality and utter

barnyard reasoning.

It was a sore spot for Reynolds fans for years and it was the biggest, single reason that Coach Lineman stepped down as Reynolds head coach. We still remember the two teams that refused to reschedule matches once the strike ended.

It is also the reason Coach Lineman speaks so highly of Commodore Perry Coach Bob Parker, who, by the way, will be inducted into the PA Hall of Fame this year with Brian Hills. If someone ever puts me in charge, I'm changing the win streak. Phooey on the two forfeit losses in 1975-76. The truth is, it was wrong then and it's wrong now. I won't count them as wins, because they were never wrestled, but don't ask me to count them as losses either.

That win streak in "matches wrestled ... on the mat" extended into 1977-78 and should read 86 straight. If anyone asks, just tell them I said so.

No asterisk needed on that one, we won them all.

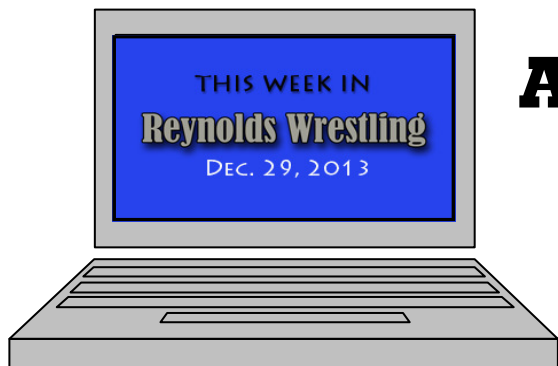

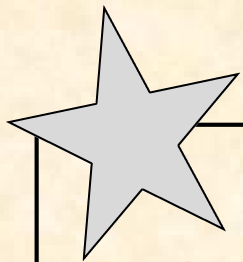

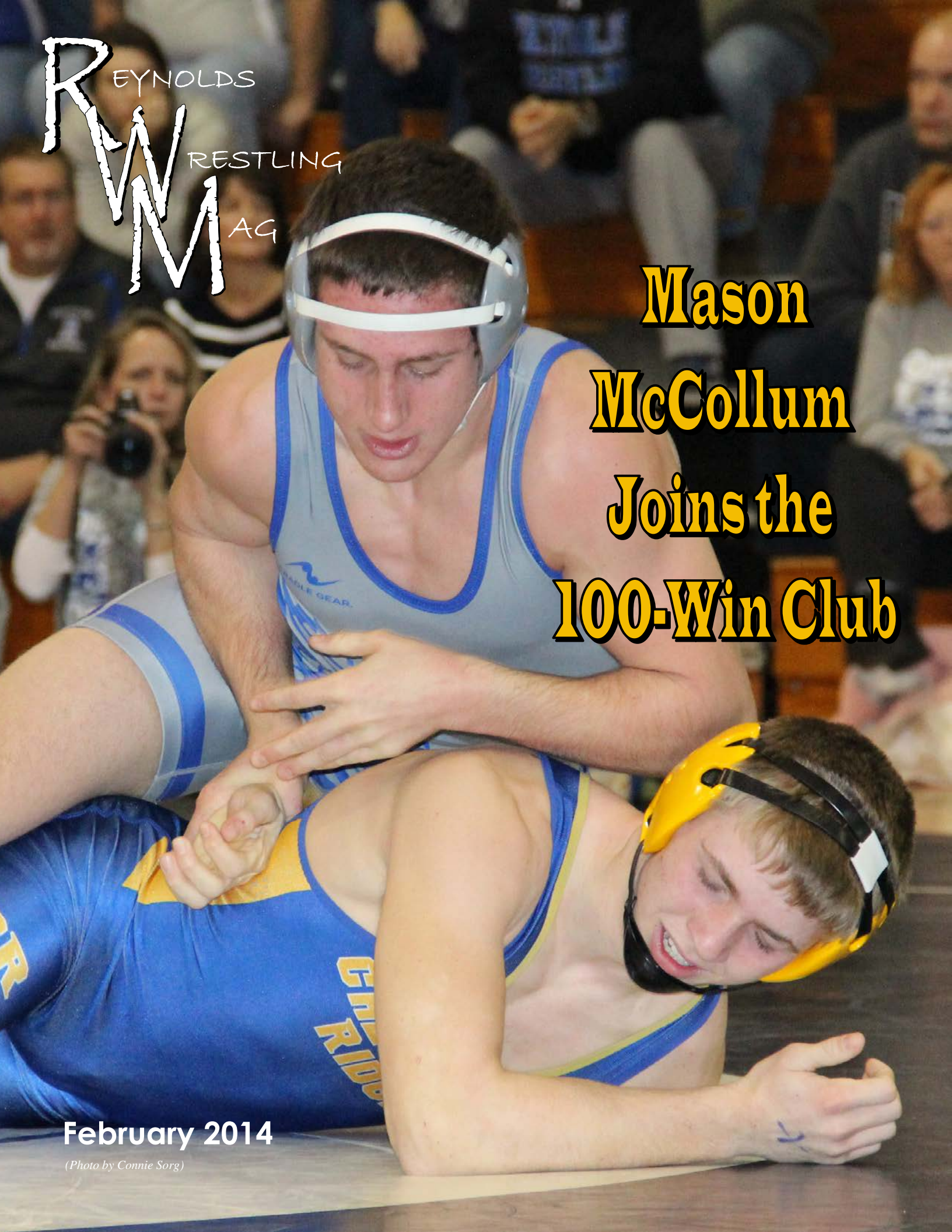

brought the crowd to its feet with a quick fall at 113 pounds.

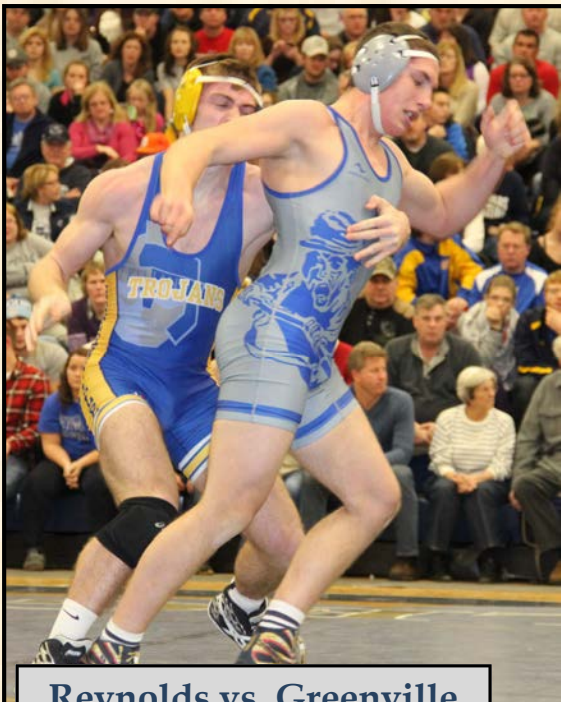
After Chaise Hauck (120) added another decision for the Raiders, junior Mike Bartolo (126) added a 58 second fall to push the RHS lead to 24-0.

"Any time you beat a team the caliber of Fort LeBeouf, you have to feel good about it," said Reynolds Coach Casey Taylor. "They probably feel the same way; but I think we left some points out on the mat tonight. It would have been nice to win a couple of those close ones."

Fort LeBeouf won six matches, with four of those bouts going to overtime. Reynolds limited the Bison to just a single bonus point in those six wins while scoring 10 of their own.

The two teams could possibly meet again at the District 10 Team Duals on Saturday, Feb. 1. Reynolds and Fort LeBeouf have dominated the teams duals and are the only teams to have ever won D-10 team titles, with Reynolds winning 11 of the 15.

Raiders finish 4-1 at Ultimate Duals

Team Looks Strong in Topping Saegertown, Burrell, Chestnut Ridge and Brockway

The Reynolds Raiders posted four straight dominant dual-match wins at Brookville before dropping a dramatic, heart-pounding 26-25 decision to the hosts at the annual Ultimate Duals on Saturday, Jan. 18.

It was just the second loss for the Raiders this season, who fell earlier to Class AAA McDowell. Ironically, both of Reynolds' losses this season were not decided until the final bout.

Against Brookville, Joel Leise (132) had a pin and Mike Bartolo (126) added a tech fall.

"I'm extremely proud of the kids," said Coach Taylor. "I could not, honestly, be more happy with them."

"I want them to win every time they go out there, but when they wrestle that way and with the intensity they had and the heart they had ... that's what this sport is all about."

Versus Brookville, Reynolds gave up a team point following the 132-pound match when Coach Taylor protested an alleged unsportsmanlike call against a Brookville wrestler that was not called by the official.

Because Brookville won eight matches to the Raiders' six, the team point deduction did not change the outcome of the match. Had the Raiders not lost a team point, Brookville would have been awarded the victory based on the criteria of most individual matches won.

It was an unfortunate ending because the Raiders had wrestled so well in dominating its first four opponents.

Earlier in the day, Reynolds had its way with Chestnut Ridge (43-12), Brockway (60-4), Saegertown (51-13) and Burrell (40-19).

"The sky is the limit for the this team," Taylor emphasized. "Our sights are set on the District 10 title, and beyond that, a state title. Our guys know that they can wrestle with anybody. We're just going to have to go out and prove it."

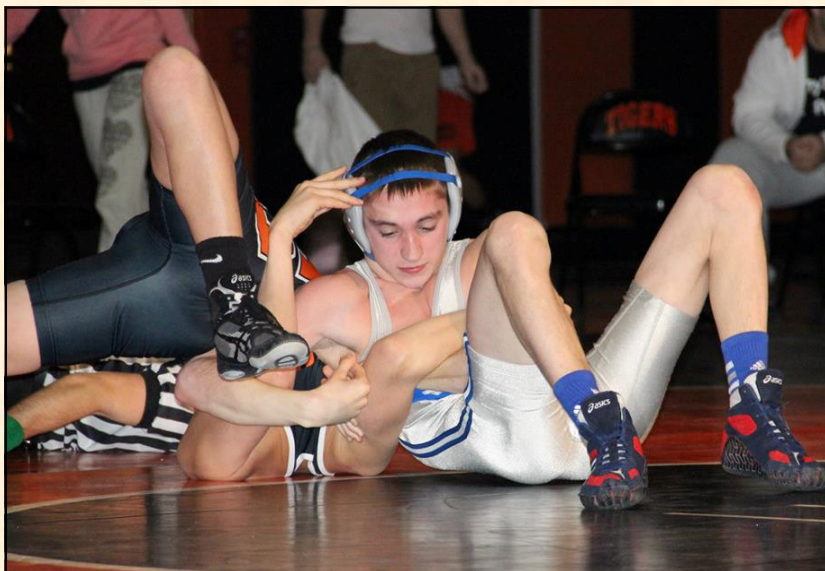

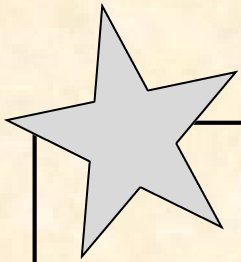

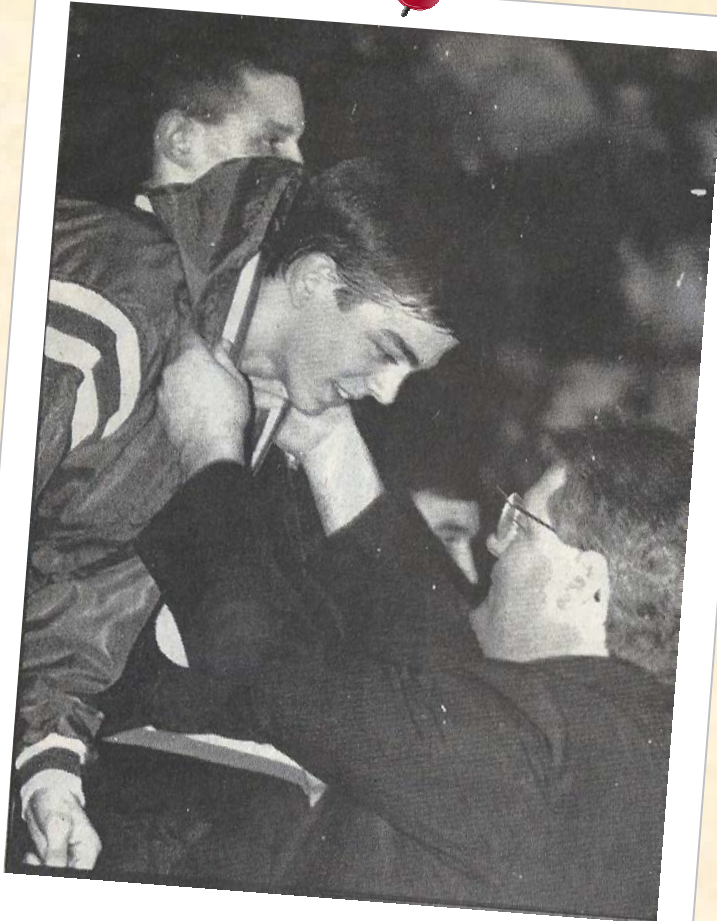

Later, Chuck pulled the same trick on Mason Beckman by showing up at the match vs. Brown in Providence, RI.

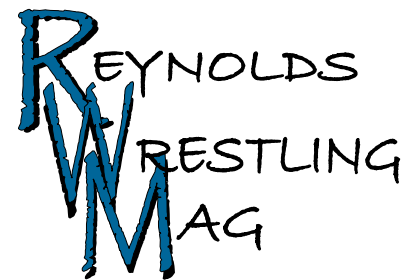
GOOD GAME — Not sure who really started it, but that won't stop me from blaming Seth Hogue since he's the first

RHS Tops Fort LeBeouf for District 10 Team Title

The Reynolds Raiders strung together three impressive victories to net their second straight District 10 Dual Match Championship on Saturday Feb. 1, 2014.

For Reynolds, it was the school's 12th District 10 team title in the 16-year history of the tournament.

Despite that bloated number, Coach Casey Taylor said winning Districts is a feeling never gets old.

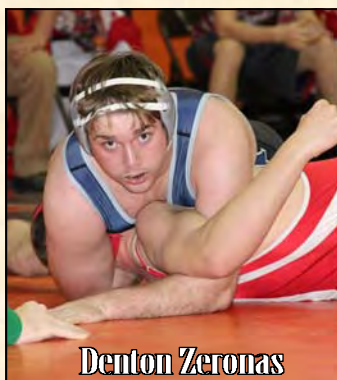

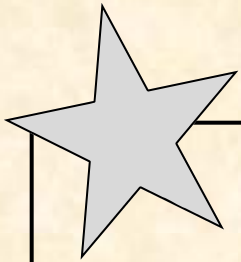

After three seasons at the helm, Casey Taylor's overall record stands at 64-10. He is 49-5 in the regular season.

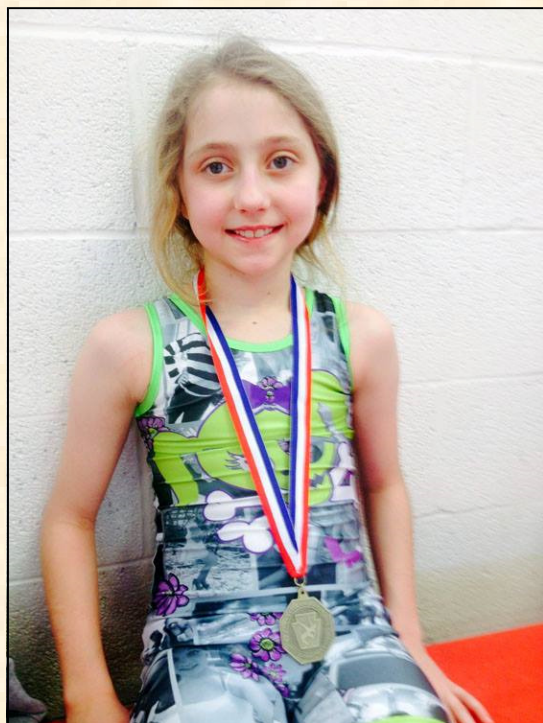

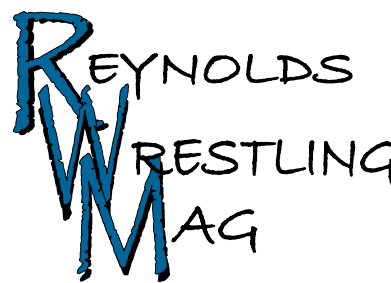

Hogue, Ringer Lead the Pack

8 Raiders Qualify for State Tournament in Hershey

HERSHEY—Even though all four classes had two representatives, it was the sophomore class that stole the show at states as Seth Hogue (113) and Gene Ringer (285) returned home from the PIAA Class AA Individual Championships with All-State honors.

Also representing the Raiders in Hershey were seniors Levi Stoyer (145) and Austin Moffett (182), juniors Mike Bartolo (126) and Mike Millero (170), and freshmen Gage Bayless (106) and Cole Rickert (220).

“The coaching staff and community are very proud of the guys who represented us,” said Coach Casey Taylor.

Hogue led the charge by posting a 3-2 tournament record to finish in fourth place. Ringer went 2-3 and closed out his year with an 8th place medal.

Hogue set himself up for a strong run with a big win in the opening round. A first-period spladle gave him all the points he needed in a 5-2 victory over Jacob Wasser of Palisades. Hogue won again in the quarterfinals, this time in overtime, over Austin Griffiths of

Southmoreland. That win assure him of a medal.

Hogue won his third match in the consolation semifinals where he started slow but finished strong in a 7-3 victory over Austin McDermitt of Burgettstown.

“Seth did a tremendous job in Hershey this year, proving to himself that he can wrestle with the best wrestlers in the state,” Taylor said in praise of the two-time state qualifier.

Ringer lost in the opening round in the ultimate tie-breaker period but then battled back for a pair of wins in the consolation bracket —with both of those wins needing extra periods, as well. In fact, all five of Ringer’s matches at states went to overtime. Ringer’s wins were over Saul Wilkins of Wilkes-Barre GAR and Dalton Chilson of Wyalusing.

“Gene showed great mental toughness in going five overtime matches to earn an eighth place as a sophomore,” Taylor said, noting that Ringer is the first Reynolds heavyweight to earn a medal as a sophomore.

“Both young men did a fantastic job,” Taylor added.

In addition to the two medals, Reynolds had four wrestlers — Bayless, Bartolo, Millero and Rickert — who won a match only to fall one victory short of earning All-State honors.

Bayless lost 6-2 in the opening round and bounced back to win his first-round consolation match over William Girard of Williams Valley, 8-6. He bowed out in the second round of consolations.

Bartolo looked very strong in the preliminary round, scoring a 14-2 major decision over Charles Johnson of Wyoming Area. In the quarterfinals, Bartolo dropped a tough 7-4 decision to eventual sixth-place finisher John Demaske of Jefferson Morgan, before being edged 4-3 in a second-round consolation match.

Millero lost his opening match in overtime, but showed a big heart by winning his first-round consolation match thanks to a takedown in OT. Millero was bumped from the tournament following a 6-3 loss.

Rickert opened a lot of eyes when he won his preliminary round match 5-2 over Seth Hitchens of South Allegheny—a truly impressive feat for a freshman. In the quarterfinals, Rickert lost by major decision to runner-up Buzzy Maines of West Branch and then was

bumped from the tournament by D-10 rival and seventh place finisher Andrew Phelps of North East.

Stoyer and Moffett wrestled well but both went 0-2. Moffett lost to state runner-up Jose Ortiz in his opening match while Stoyer was edged by eventual fourth-place finisher Jacob Oliver.

“I know the outcomes may not be what they wanted, but we could not be more proud of the way they wrestled and the sportsmanship they demonstrated in some tough losses,” Taylor said of his senior representatives.

The good news for the Raiders is that six of the eight place-winners will return next season, including both medal winners. Even more promising is that all six of those returning wrestlers won at least one match in Hershey.

“Looking forward, the pieces appear to be aligned for something special,” Taylor said. “Next year’s seniors are eager to lead the team and with an abundance of talented underclassmen, Raider Nation should be looking forward to building off the strong performance of this year.”

Another Team Title as Raiders send Eight 8 to State

Senior Levi Stoyer won his second straight Northwest Regional championship and freshman Cole Rickert stepped up to win his first as the Reynolds Raiders captured the Class AA Northwest Regional team title and qualified eight wrestlers for the state tournament.

"Levi joins a very special group of Reynolds wrestlers who have won multiple Regional titles," said Coach Casey Taylor. "We are certainly very proud of his accomplishments."

Stoyer (145) was a 3-1 winner while Rickert used a five-point toss to highlight his 8-5 victory. Also advancing to the finals were freshman Gage Bayless (106) and junior Mike Bartolo (126).

Finishing third and also advancing to states were Seth Hogue (113), Mike Millero (170) and Gene Ringer (285). Mason McCollum (152) and Austin Moffett (182) ended fourth.

Moffett later earned a state tournament berth when Cranberry's Zach Bruce pulled out of the PIAAs with a serious knee injury.

Reynolds' other Regional qualifiers were Chaise Hauck (120), Joel Leise (132), Alex DiGregorio (138) and Kegan Miller (160). All 13 wrestlers contributed wins and helped the Raiders score much needed team points as Brookville made a race of it, finishing just nine points back.

Beckman, D'Urso Earn All-American Honors

Matthews, Henry also qualify for national championships

Lehigh University red-shirt sophomore **Mason Beckman ('11)** earned All-American status in his second trip to the NCAA Division I National Championships.

Earlier, Beckman won his first EIWA title to advance to nationals, where he was the No. 6 seed.

He opened the NCAA tournament with a technical fall, advancing to meet 11th seed Ryan Mango of Stanford. Mango had been ranked as high as No. 2 earlier in the season and is a two-time All-American. Mason was in control, however, and held off a late attack by Mango for a 5-4 win. In the quarterfinals, Mason dropped a 3-1 decision to eventual national champion Tony Ramos of Iowa. Ramos used a late takedown to seal the victory.

Beckman bounced back with a 6-1 victory over Mark Grey of Cornell to clinch All-American status. He followed that up with a 6-3 triumph over Central Michigan's Joe Roth, before losing by decision to No. 1 seed Joe Colon of UNI in the consolation semifinals.

He was then edged by David Thorn of Minnesota to finish sixth.

Mason finished the season with a fantastic 29-6 record and is now 56-17 in his two-year career. Later, he was named Lehigh's "Athlete of the Year," which is presented to the wrestler who makes the biggest athletic contributions to the team throughout the season.

Mercyhurst University mat star **Dylan D'Urso ('12)**, made his second trip to the NCAA Division II tournament in as many seasons. D'Urso qualified by finishing as the runner-up in the 141 pound class at the Super Region I qualifier.

At the national tournament in Cleveland, Dylan won his first match to advance to the quarterfinals where he dropped a heartbreaking 3-1 decision to Charles Napier of Fort Hays State. Dylan would respond well, however, rattling off four straight wins to earn All-American Status and finish in 3rd place.

My time at the 2014 NCAA Division I National Wrestling tournament was one that I will never forget. From missing my first flight in Pittsburgh to the last whistle where David Taylor capped off an amazing collegiate career with his third national title - my four days in Oklahoma City were everything I expected.

Let's start off with Mason Beckman, 2014 All American at 133lbs. Consistent throughout the event, Mason was on the attack from the neutral position in every bout and was a hammer on top. In a tied bout with eventual national champion Tony Ramos in the quarterfinals, Mason gave up a takedown on the edge of the mat late in the third period to send him to the consolation bracket.

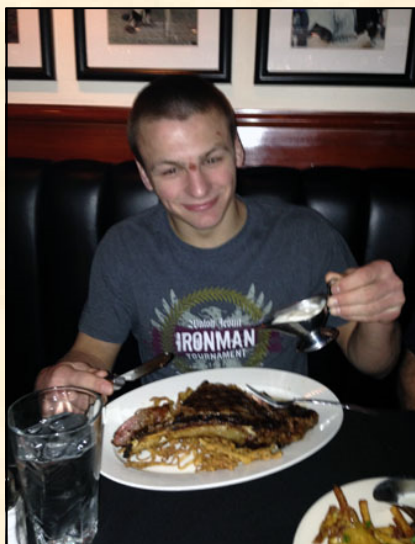
From there, Mason rattled off two straight wins including one off of a familiar foe, Mark Grey of Cornell, to reach All American status. After seeing him live, it's obvious that he is right there with the best in the nation and I'm confident we'll see more of the same from Mason in the future - as I know he has nothing but a national championship on his mind.



Let's move on now to true freshman 157-pounder Austin Matthews. Anybody that knows Austin understands that this is not the end result that he wanted; but they also know that he will only use this as motivation to be up high on the medal stand in the immediate future.

In the three matches he wrestled at nationals, Austin created a stir in the arena and received many "ooohs" and "aahhhhs" with his style and tenacity -

both of which we were spoiled with at RHS for four years. Austin's future looks bright and with a year of maturity and growth under his belt he will be a force to be reckoned with for years to come. As a side-note, Anthony Perrotti who finished 8th and reached All American status at 157 pounds, was pinned by Austin in Clarion's dual meet with Rutgers.

I was able to catch up with Austin in Oklahoma City and we spent some time together at Mickey Mantle's steakhouse during a break in the action. He agreed that to even make it here as a true freshman is a feat of its own, but to get down here and win a match is a definite confidence booster. As with most elite athletes, Austin is often his own biggest critic, but he was very relaxed and able to take a positive outlook home with him.

In more general terms, the experience of the national tournament is unlike any other wrestling event. Gasps of excitement fill the arena from the opening round all the way through the finals. Penn State, Iowa, Minnesota and Oklahoma State all have an outstanding followings and dominating crowds. You immediately recognize what section

they are sitting in and you know when one of their wrestlers is on the mat. When an Iowa wrestler loses the whole crowd cheers, and I got a kick out of that as it was very similar to when one of our wrestlers loses at Sections, Districts, or Regionals.

The team race was crazy from start to finish, with Penn State holding off Minnesota and Oklahoma State to win its fourth straight title. David Taylor and Ed Ruth were dominant from the start and closed their careers with national titles. When Ruth is called to the mat the entire arena echoes "RUUUUUUTH."

Best match of the night? The heavyweights!! The crowd was electric during this match. Two takedowns in the third period by the sophomore from NC State to knock off the two-time returning national champ!! These guys were moving around like high school 106 pounders!

My favorite moment of the weekend? The stare down prior to the 133-pound finals! ESPN didn't do it justice. As you know, Ramos is famous for stepping on the line and staring down his opponent in an attempt to get in his head; but Tyler Graff from Wisconsin wasn't phased by it and toed the line and stared right back. This must have went on for a solid minute and drew the crowd to its feet cheering at a high level. It was one for the ages.

In the consolation finals, Dylan avenged his earlier loss to Napier this time winning in the tiebreaker on two seconds of riding time. D'Urso finished his sophomore year 32-4, including a perfect 18-0 in dual meets. His career record stands at 62-10. In addition, D'Urso was named a PSAC winter Top 10 award recipient. The award is designed to recognize student-athletes who excel in the classroom as well as in athletics. D'Urso was also named to the D-II All-Academic team based on his 3.90 GPA in intelligence studies.

Clarion University true freshman **Austin Matthews ('13)** also earned a berth in the NCAA Division I tournament in Oklahoma City via the EWL conference.

Matthews impressively won the EWL 157-pound weight class by defeating No. 15 John Greisheimer of Edinboro, 9-6.

At nationals, Austin drew #6 seed Nestor Taffur of Boston College in the opening round. Austin scored the match's opening takedown, but was put to his back and pinned in a scramble situation. His second match had a similar result, but this time it was Matthews who scored the fall, reversing his opponent to his back after giving up an opening takedown. Austin then lost to 12th seeded Luke Smith of Central Michigan to end his season. Matthews finished the year 28-9 and was named PSAC and EWL "Freshman of the Year" for his strong campaign.

Mercyhurst NorthEast freshman **Jamar Henry ('13)** finished his impressive first year at 14-9. Henry ad-

vanced all the way to the NJCAA championships, where he went 1-2. Jamar won his opening bout 6-3 over Andy Glaser of North Iowa Community College. Henry then lost to the tournament's eventual third place finisher, before dropping a tough 7-6 decision in the consolations.

Luke Taylor ('10) saw his career at the United States Coast Guard Academy come to an end with a win in his final bout. Luke finished fifth in the Northeast Regional Tournament. He advanced all the way to the semi-finals with two wins to open the tournament before dropping a 5-0 decision to Lou Puca, a wrestler who went on to earn D-III All American status. Taylor lost another match in the consolations before capping his season with a 14-8 win against Daniel Graff of SUNY-Oneonta. Luke's injury-riddled senior season ended with 9 wins and 4 losses.

In off the mat news, Luke was recently informed that upon graduation, he will be assigned to flight school in Pensacola, FL. Congratulations, Luke!

Blake Heim ('12) closed out his sophomore year at Thiel College with a 17-9 record. Heim went 1-2 with a fall at the Mideast Regional Championships. Blake notched eight pins this season.

Rider's **Clint Morrison** (son of **Tim – '78**), advanced to the NCAA tournament with a 3rd place finish at the EWL tournament.

At the NCAA's, Morrison won his opening bout, before dropping a 5-4 decision on a riding time point to No. 4 seed, Max Thomusseit of Pitt. Morrison then dropped his consolation match, ending his tournament. He finished with an impressive 19-6 mark.

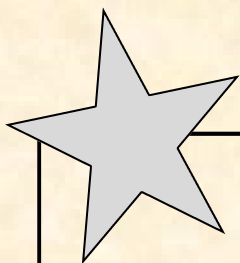
