What Should We Expect in 2017-18?

It's natural to look ahead and wonder — even try to predict what a new wrestling season will bring.

Unlike last year's squad that dominated opponents and smashed records, I expect this year's team to be in some real battles.

There is enough talent and experience to allow the team to compete with anyone and yet enough youth and inexperience to make things exciting.

Overall, it's a nice blend and I believe this year's team has what it takes to take us on two more rides to Hershey.

History teaches us to never count out a Reynolds team and this team certainly has way too much talent to be dismissed. **My prediction:** The Raiders will be in the running for a pair of state titles.

LOOKING AHEAD — RHS begins the season having won 25 consecutive dual matches. Modest compared to the school record of 115, but in this era when only one Class AA school

can finish unbeaten — it is almost certainly among the longest winning streaks in the state.




Here are a few other things to look forward to in 2017-18:

- RHS has 298 Section champions. No. 300 will likely come this season, considering there are 5 returning champions. Who will be No. 300 and join Bucky Moffett (No. 1), Jeff Groover (No. 100) and Joel Davis (No. 200) as landmark champs?
- Junior Beau Bayless enters the season with 72 wins and could be the next to join the 100-Win Club. Senior Cole Matthews (130) is already a member.
- Matthews has a legitimate shot to reach 100 career pins—that is something no other Reynolds

wrestler has even accomplished. Cole has averaged 25 in each of this first three seasons.

- Reynolds begins the year with an all-time dual match record of 815 -94-2, a win percentage of 89.6.
- Coach Casey Taylor begins the season with a coaching record of 133-17. His teams have won three state titles.

As a wrestler at RHS, Coach Taylor was 123-10-2 and won three state titles, making it hard to determine whether he was a better wrestler or a better coach.

Potentially Dangerous

Experience, Youth & Coaching Will Lead Raiders to Another Successful Season

When your favorite wrestling team is the Reynolds Raiders, the start of a new season is always accompanied by a sense of expectation.

As Reynolds fans we've gotten spoiled and last year's dominant run to PIAA gold only made things worse. The record-setting Raiders of 2016-17 finished 23-0, won the PIAA Class AA Dual Match and Team Points championships and sophomore Beau Bayless won a state title to lead a pack of eight PIAA placers.

The team put a cherry on top of an incredibly tasty season by winning a national title in June at the 2017 AAU Scholastic Duals at Disney World. Yes, it was that kind of fairy tale season.

This year's team will not be tasked with repeating all that was accomplished last season, but to simply continue the unrelenting legacy that is Reynolds Wrestling.

While there are many factors that go into a successful season, there are three - experience, youth and coaching - that really pop to the forefront as the 2017-18 season commences.

"When you consider the talent that we have coming back, and you add in the freshman class that we have

coming up, I think that makes us a dangerous bunch," said Coach Casey Taylor, who is 133-17 through his first six seasons. "There will be obstacles to overcome - there always are - but I think this team has an awful lot of potential. I've been impressed with what I've seen so far."

Topping the list of returning Raiders are a pair of state champions. Nationally-ranked Cole Matthews, and Bayless, now a junior, are legit. They will not have to do it alone as seven others return who reached double-digit wins last year.

"To know that we are sending out a line-up that has two state champions, three medalists and five state qualifiers, that's a tremendous start right there," Taylor said. "But then you add in guys like Jarod Miller and Adam Wilcox who were Regional qualifiers ... they bring a lot of experience, as well."

"We've got a handful of other guys who are eager to contribute ... guys like Wyatt Owen, Rocco Bartolo, Mason Wilkerson and Tyliir Shannon. We're excited

about the team we are going to put on the mat this season."

"The truth is that a majority of this team already has a gold medal, but I can tell you that these guys are not satisfied," Taylor said. "They've heard the whispers that we've lost too much to win another state championship; it's become personal to them. They want to do it again."

Youth, more specifically *talented* youth, is another key component to continued success and Reynolds has that covered in the form of eight extremely talented freshmen who will compete on the varsity level.

If you are not already familiar with Gary Steen, Jordan DeCarmen, Kaeden Berger, Alex Ischo, Cole Toy, Liam Foore, Rocco John-Daniello and Dreyvin Livingston, you soon will be. They are a special group and will help keep this Blue & Gray machine running for the next four years.

Individual classes this talented usually come along once every decade, so RHS is blessed to be able to welcome this group one year after saying goodbye to the Class of 2017 and its five, 100-match winners.

Coaching is also a strength of the RHS program. After taking over for Hall of Fame coach Brian Hills (370-39-1) in 2011-12, Taylor has been outstanding. His teams have already won three state titles and he has guided three individual state champions, 26 place-winners and 40 state qualifiers.

"There are a lot of factors that go into why I like coaching so much," Taylor said. "First and foremost it is a love for the sport of wrestling. Getting to coach with my brothers and some of my best friends makes it really special. Of course, we always get great support from the administration, the community and the fans. Coaching at Reynolds is just the best place to be."

The Raiders have completed eliminations, and except for a few challenge matches for the Ironman tournament, the starting lineup is set for opening day.

The lighter weight classes will be the strength of this year's team as the first three or four weight classes feature outstanding depth and some season-long battles for starting positions.

Steen, a two-time Pennsylvania Junior Wrestling state champion, will start at 106 pounds. He is ranked as the No. 12 incoming freshman in the state by PaPowerWrestling.com. He will be confronted

by sophomore Cole Bayless who went 6-1 in restricted action last year.

Sophomore Wilcox has won the 113-pound spot by beating out freshman Livingston. Wilcox is a returning starter who will look to improve on his 26-win freshman campaign.

Beau Bayless is the man at 120 but really had to work to get past determined freshman Berger. Foore, another talented freshman, makes the Raiders rock solid at 120.

Junior Andrew Ischo went 36-8 last season and finished seventh in the state. He will be the starter at 126 pounds, up one weight class from last year.

Bartolo is primed to step in at 132 pounds. Forced to be patient behind a pair of state place-winners the last two seasons, Bartolo, a junior, appears to have all the tools he needs to be successful. He has bided his time the last two years by placing first and third at PowerAde JV tournament.

Freshman Alex Ischo fought off senior Tylir Shannon and classmate Lee Walter to earn the starting spot at 138 pounds. Ischo was one of nine Raiders to qualify for the 2017 Junior High state champion-


ships. Like Bartolo, Shannon has paid his dues behind some very talented wrestlers. Don't be surprised if he shows up in the starting lineup at some point.

Matthews and his remarkable 130-13 career record check in at 145 pounds. The University of Pittsburgh recruit will look to wrap up his scholastic career as the eighth Reynolds wrestler to win four PIAA medals.

There is a logjam of talent in the next three weight classes with seven legitimate candidates

Senior Hunter Michaels, a two-time PIAA qualifier, will start the season at 152 pounds. Hunter owns 60 career wins after going 33-7 last season and winning Section 2-AA, District 10 and Northwest Regional titles.

Others in contention for starting spots from 152 to 170 are seniors Mason Wilkerson and Ethan Kasbee, junior Hunter Thompson, sophomore Bryce McCloskey and freshmen DeCarmen and Toy.



Thompson showed tremendous improvement last season and has 16 varsity wins under his belt. He has earned the starting spot at 160 pounds while Toy will get the nod at 170.

McCloskey was 3-6 last year, but three of his losses were to state place-winners Jacob Oliver, Jared McGill and Luke Funck. McCloskey starts the season injured as does DeCarmen. Once healthy, they could certainly make an impact.

Sophomore Evan Miller has his sights set on the starting job at 182 pounds, but it is also possible that one of the wrestlers from the aforementioned logjam will bump up to challenge him.

Senior Jarod Miller is back for his third season as a starter at 195 pounds. He was 26-14 last season and just missed a trip to the state tournament. He will be backed by Xavier Coburn.

Junior Wyatt Owen returns at 220 pounds. Owen started most of his sophomore season and was solid in posting a 13-7 record.

Derek Skeehan, also a junior, will be the Raiders' 285-pounder, but like McCloskey and DeCarmen, starts the season on the injured list. Skeehan qualified for the 2017 state tournament while going 27-17. Holding down the heavyweight spot until Skeehan returns will be freshman Rocco John-Daniello. RJD took the year off last year, but is a former PAJW state champion with loads of potential.

"I like how the chemistry of this team is coming together," Taylor said. "The way it worked out with most of these freshmen going to Disney with us this past summer really helped. They got a chance to see

first-hand what last year's team was all about. Now they are going to be a big part of it as we move forward."



Making the Grade

Eleven Former Raiders Competing in College

As the Raiders prepare to kick-off the season at the Ironman Tournament, the college season is already well underway.

An amazing 11 RHS graduates appear on college rosters this season. That's more than enough Reynolds alum to make a college team — although they'd have to shuffle some weight classes to fill all the sports.

What follows is a rundown of where these 11 wrestlers are and how they've faired in November.

Three-time national qualifier **Austin Matthews ('13)** leads the way. Ranked 16th in the nation by Intermat, Austin is in his redshirt senior season at Edin-

boro University. Competing at 165 pounds, Austin dropped his only match of the young season and currently sits at 64-25 in his career.

Clarion junior **Michael Bartolo ('15)** is redshirting this season which means he will defer one season of eligibility. He will still have two seasons remaining. Mike is currently battling an injury but intends to compete in Open tournaments after he heals.

Sophomore **Seth Hogue ('16)** has locked down the starting spot at 149 for Bucknell University. Seth opened the season with a win over Cal State Bakersfield's Kalani Tonge. He then dropped matches in duals against Edinboro and Lehigh. Seth was then pinned in a dual vs. Penn State, but

not before he picked up a takedown against Zain Retherford, a returning 2X national champion and the No. 1 ranked wrestler in the country.

Seth was the victim of a poor draw in the Navy Classic. He lost his opening bout to No. 1 seed and eventual champion Matthew Kolodzik of Princeton, and then fell to the eventual fourth-place finisher in the consolations.

Pitt freshman **Cole Rickert ('17)** will back up senior Ryan Solomon at heavyweight for the Panthers. Solomon was one win away from All-American status last season. Cole opened the season at the Clarion Open where he went 2-2. He later placed sixth at the

Eastern Michigan Open while competing in a sophomore- and freshman-only division. Rickert also placed fourth at the Mat Town Open in Lock Haven, again going 2-2.

Cam Cianci ('13) is back for his sophomore season at Thiel College. Cam is 0-2 competing at both 174 and 184 pounds. Cam will become a junior, academically, at the end of the first semester.

Freshman **Gavin Wilkerson ('17)** and senior **Mason McCollum ('14)** are both wrestling at 165 pounds for Mercyhurst University, with Gavin currently serving as the Lakers' starter. Gavin opened his career by going 1-2 at the Ohio Intercollegiate Open. He then



won back to back dual matches against Embry-Riddle and Sierra. McCollum also won an exhibition match against Embry-Riddle.

Gavin and Mason both wrestled at the Mile High Open where Gavin went 5-2 to place fifth and Mason went 1-2, with one of his losses coming to Gavin.


Freshmen **Gage Bayless ('17)** and **Chaise Hauck ('17)** are both at the

University of Chicago, where Chaise has earned the starting spot at 141 pounds. Both opened their careers by going 3-2 at the Trine Invitational. Hauck later dropped a decision in a dual against Elmhurst.

Waynesburg University junior **Mike Millero ('15)** went 1-2 at 184 pounds at the W&J Invitational. He also picked up a fall in a dual against Alma College at the Mt. Union Duals.

Freshman **Joel Leise ('17)** will red-shirt for Gannon University this year. Joel did experience his first taste of college action at the Findlay Open, where he went 2-2.

Gannon opened the season ranked No. 5 in the NCAA Division II national poll. It is the school's highest ranking ever.





Raiders Top Cathedral Prep

A Match of Inches & Seconds

In the wide, wild world of sports, highly-competitive athletic contests are sometimes referred to as "A game of inches."

We got a taste of what that means during the 31-29 win over Cathedral Prep on Dec. 23 — one of the most thrilling dual matches to take place in the RHS gymnasium in recent memory.

Looking back, not only was the team score close, but so were a handful of individual matches, including three that went to overtime. Inches — and seconds — came into play in more than a few of those bouts.

At 145 pounds, Hunter Michaels fought off his back for more than 100 seconds in the first period. He was within inches of being pinned.

Later, when Michaels brought the house down with a third-period fall (*see cover photo*) inches again came into play as he secured the pin with at least one of Marquis McClorin's shoulder blades out of bounds.

In previous seasons, this would not have been a fall. A new rule—enacted just this season—allows pins to be called if shoulder blades are out of bounds as long as supporting points remain in bounds. It was close. Inches.

Seconds mattered at 132 pounds when Rocco Bartolo nearly surrendered a last-second takedown in his bout with Tyler McKinney.

It was so close to being two that Prep coaches asked referees Gene Fertig and Rob Powell to talk about it. They did, but upheld the initial ruling that time had expired.

Bartolo nailed a takedown in overtime to secure the win and give Reynolds a win in a pivotal match.

Inches mattered to Cole Matthews

at 138 pounds when he held Andrew Stark on his back for most of the third period. Cole ended up with a major decision at a juncture when two additional points would have been huge.



Give Stark credit for fighting off the fall for all those seconds.

And finally, inches and seconds again came into play again at 220 pounds when Raider Wyatt Owen got tossed to his back with less than 10 seconds remaining in his match-up with Kareem Carson.

It was so close that I still can't talk about it (still holding my breath) and it may have been the closest one of all. A pin there and Prep almost certainly wins the match.

A match of inches and seconds, it certainly was, as well as another great chapter in the Reynolds-Prep rivalry.

BEAU AND BOUZAKIS— Beau Bayless's match in the finals of the POWERade Tournament vs. 8th grader Nic Bouzakis of Lake Highland Prep, FL was a first in the 51-year history of the tournament.


As you may have guessed, Bouzakis is not your average 8th grader. Last season, he won a Florida state championship as a 7th grader. (Florida is one of a handful of states that allows junior high students to compete at the high school level.)

No doubt Bouzakis is tough and I give the kid his props, but a chronic bloody nose never let Beau get into a

rhythm. Beau told us after the match that once they wrapped his head to stop the bleeding that he could not breath.

Even though Beau came out on the short end of a 10-4 decision and Bouzakis became the first 8th grader to win a POWERade title, I love that Beau battled to the final buzzer. Watching the match a second time on PCN made me appreciate his effort even more. He never quit.

Meanwhile, keep an eye on this Bouzakis kid, he's something special.

Matthews Repeats as Powerade Champ

CANONSBURG - Cole Matthews won his second straight title and the Raiders finished fifth in the team standings to highlight action at the 51st annual POWERade Tournament Dec. 29 and 30.

Three other Raiders also secured spots in the Top 8. Junior Beau Bayless was second at 113, freshman Gary Steen was fourth at 106 and senior Jarod Miller was 8th at 195. Reynolds entered 13 wrestlers in the tournament and all contributed to the team points total by winning at least one match.

Wyoming Seminary won the tournament with 272 points. Rounding out the Top 5 were Lake Highland Prep (202), Parkersburg -South (178.5), Cathedral Prep (145) and Reynolds (137.5).

Matthews' finals against Jack Davis of Wyoming Seminary was more like a chess match than a wrestling match as the two exchanged escapes through the first six minutes. Matthews took the only good shot of the match in the sudden victory period and made it pay dividends.

It was Cole's fourth POWERade medal, as he fin-

ished second as a sophomore and fifth as a freshman. His tournament record was 6-0 and he is now 17-2 this season and 147-15 for his career.


Bayless squared off with 8th grade phenom Nik Bouzakis of Lake Highland Prep, FL in the 113-pound finals. POWERade allows 8th graders if the home state allows them to compete.

Even though he scored the first takedown of the match, Beau was never able to gain traction because of a chronic nosebleed and Bouzakis won a 10-4 decision. Beau's tournament record was 5-1 and he is now 18-4 this year.


Gary Steen finished a 5-2 tournament with a fourth-place medal, dropping a 6-2 decision to Tim Devine. Gary (16-4) was in the match until the final seconds, giving up a late two points on an acrobatic takedown attempt. He wrestled extremely well all weekend and will likely move up in the state rankings from his current No. 7 spot.

Jarod Miller worked his way to the POWERade podium thanks to a 3-3 weekend. His only losses were to the first, sixth and seventh place finishers. In his final bout, Jarod (11-7) dropped a hard-fought 3-1 decision to Cathedral Prep sophomore Dorian Crosby.

An Old-Fashioned Brawl

Raiders Hold On for Thrilling 2-point Win over Cathedral Prep

Reynolds built a 31-6 advantage through the first nine weight classes and held on for dear life to win a thrilling 31-29 victory over nationally-ranked Cathedral Prep on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 23, at RHS.

"To be honest, I miss these kinds of matches," said Reynolds Coach Casey Taylor. "This is the way I remember matches being when I was growing up. I wish we had more opportunities for matches like this at home."

Thanks to Gary Steen's win by forfeit at 106 pounds, Adam Wilcox's heart-pounding overtime win and a quick fall from Beau Bayless (120) Reynolds grabbed an early

15-0 lead.

Freshman Paniro Johnson got Prep on the board with a win over Andrew Ischo at 126 pounds, but Reynolds bounced right back with three straight wins.

Rocco Bartolo (132) nailed a textbook takedown in overtime to pick up a decision over 2016 state qualifier Tyler McKinney and Cole Matthews (138) had Andrew Stark on his back for most of the third period en route to a win by major decision.

At 145, Prep's Marquis McClorin had Hunter Michaels on his back nearly the entire first period before Michaels regained his composure and rallied. His third-period takedown tied the bout and his subsequent cradle ended it at 5:27.

Gary Steen (106) had a quick pin





to give Reynolds life at 34-18. Cole Bayless dug deep to win an overtime thriller at 113 but without bonus points the match was mathematically over at 34-21.


Beau Bayless (120) accepted a forfeit and Andrew Ischo (126)





Raider alum Chuck Coryea ('72) is helping to organize. We are hoping it will be well attended.



Raiders Earn Top Seed for District 10 Team Championships

Winners of the District 10 Region I regular season title, the Reynolds Raiders have been named the top seed for the D-10 Class AA Team Championships scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 3 at Sharon High School.

Reynolds will be gunning for its sixth straight title and its 16th in the 20-year history of the event. Reynolds is 40-4 in all matches wrestled at the D-10 duals.

The Raiders face a familiar opponent in this year's opening round — Fort LeBoeuf.

The Bison are the only team to have ever beaten Reynolds at the duals, that happening four times

with the most recent coming in 2012, Casey Taylor's first year as the RHS head coach.

Reynolds and Fort LeBoeuf have met 13 times at the Team Championships — all in the finals — with Reynolds holding an 9-4 advantage.

A win in the opening round would advance Reynolds to meet the winner of the Conneaut vs. Eisenhower match. Conneaut is the Region II runner-up and Eisenhower finished second behind Harbor Creek in Region III and is the No. 4 seed.

First-round matches in the bot-

tom half of the bracket will feature Region II champion and No. 3 seed Greenville vs. Region III runner-up Mercer, and Region III champion and No. 2 seed Harbor Creek squaring off with Region I third-place finisher Sharpsville.

At the 2017 championships, Reynolds went 3-0 and defeated Harbor Creek, 56-6, in the championship finals.

The D-10 champ will receive an automatic berth in the 2018 PIAA Team Championships in Hershey.

The D-10 runner-up and third-place finisher will have wrestle-in matches vs. opponents from District 7 (WPIAL) and District 6, respectively. Those matches will be held on Monday, Feb. 5.

Raiders Go Five and Oh!!! at Brookville

BROOKVILLE, Pa. — Reynolds capped an unbeaten day with a convincing 44-12 victory over host Brookville on Saturday Dec. 20 at the Ultimate Duals.

By going 5-0, Reynolds improved its season record to 17-1.



The Raiders started their day with a 45-19 victory over Chestnut Ridge, and followed that up with a 66-2 triumph over South Fayette.

Later, Reynolds topped Freedom, 50-12, and then took care of Burrell, 48-13.

In the finale vs. Brookville, everything seemed to go the Raiders' way as Hunter Thompson (170), Adam Wilcox (113) and Beau Bayless (120) led the charge with falls. Cole Matthews (138) was handed a forfeit.

Reynolds won 10 of 14 individual matches, including several outstanding individual matchups.

At 145 pounds, Hunter Michaels picked up a takedown in the sudden victory period to edge Brookville's Dontae Constable, who bumped up one weight from his usual spot at 138.

Jarod Miller scored a late takedown to edge Xavier Molnar at 195 pounds. The two state-ranked wrestlers have met several times during their careers, with Jarod winning for the first time.

Mason Wilkerson (152) gave up the first takedown but then rattled off eight straight points in an 8-2 win, and Cole Toy (182) sealed a solid 5-2 victory with a late takedown.

Junior Rocco Bartolo (132) topped off a 5-0 day - that included a win over a state ranked wrestler - with a 14-8 win, while Gary Steen (106) added a major decision.

Junior Wyatt Owen (220) wrestled a strong match but came out on the short end of a 6-4 decision vs. Tyler Cook.



SHARON - Beau Bayless won the 100th match of his career and Reynolds wrapped up an 18-1 regular season scoring a 74-3 win over Sharon on Wednesday, Jan. 24.

Reynolds concludes Region I action with a perfect 9-0 record, winning its 21st consecutive league championship.

In securing the victory, the Raiders scored eight falls, two major decisions, two forfeits and a win by injury default.

Junior Hunter Thompson (160) had a nice win for the Raiders. He entered the third period trailing 6-2 but picked up an escape, takedown and the fall over Tiger DeAndre Young. Hunter Michaels (145) and Evan Miller

(182) had the major decisions.

Sharon's lone win came from sophomore standout Sully Allen who improved to 21-2 with a 3-0 win over Mason Wilkerson. Allen scored all of his points in the second period with an escape and takedown.

Reynolds will now shift gears and look toward the postseason which will commence with the District 10 Class AA Team Championships on Saturday, Feb. 3 in Sharon.

Coach Casey Taylor has confirmed for RWM that the Raiders will apply for participation in the duals. As the No. 1 ranked team in Pennsylvania and as the defending D-10 and PIAA champions, the Raiders are expected to be the No. 1 seed.

Reynolds has won 21 consecutive conference championships.

The move proved challenging as Chaise dropped all four bouts as his team went 2-2 at the Division III National Duals. Chaise stayed at 149 for a dual against No. 25 Wheaton College, and earned a key victory by decision in the Maroon's 21-18 win.

Hauck made the drop back to 141 when UChicago hosted No. 14 North Central College. Chaise was victorious in sudden victory. **Gage Bayless ('17)** moved into the 149 slot and dropped a 5-3 decision. North Central won the dual 27-12.



Raiders Take Aim at 4th Straight PIAA Title

I will always be proud to say that Neal Lineman was my high school wrestling coach.

But the truth of the matter is that I just made it into the Lineman era. I had Coach Lineman only one season – my freshman year.

For most of my wrestling career at Reynolds Mark Reichard was my wrestling coach.

One day Coach Reichard walked into the wrestling room, had us circle up and announced a brand new Reynolds Wrestling mantra ... “Be a hog!”

Coach Reichard was not talking about a buffet, sadly; but was referring to scoring points in a wrestling match.

He wanted us to score as many points as we could muster ... wanted us to constantly be adding to our total and ultimately working for the fall.

I think this year’s team can benefit from that same advice — at least in terms of winning another state championship.

As we prepare to head back to Hershey, I encourage the Raiders to take Coach Reichard’s advice and “Be a hog!” and bring home that fourth straight trophy.

Reynolds has won the last three PIAA state championships in Class AA —back-to-back duals titles and last year’s team points title.

Surprisingly, that is not a record. Reynolds won five straight PIAA trophies from 2005 to 2007. Two duals titles and three team points totals.

I’ll be honest, I can’t look at those numbers without wondering if we can reach 900 wins before we reach 100 losses.

As crazy as it sounds, I think we can.

For starters, the Raiders are 48-1 the last two seasons, so all we really need to do is keep doing what we are doing.

Sure, we’ll lose four starters off the state championship team but there was plenty of talent on the bench this year.

Guys like Kaeden Berger, Adam Wilcox, Jordan DeCarmen, Rocco John Daniello, Liam Foore, Alex Ischo, Bryce McCloskey and Evan Miller all saw some action this season but were not full-time starters. They’ll be back and they’ll be better — and hungry.

An under-appreciated junior class will take their place as leaders, primed to write their own chapter in the Reynolds Wrestling history book.

I’m not a gambling man and predictions aren’t really my bag, but I would not be surprised to see the 900 mark eclipsed before triple digits are reached in the loss column.

A 90-percent winning percentage after 1,000 wrestling matches? Why that’s just Reynolds bein’ Reynolds.





Raiders Go Back-to-Back to Earn Record 5th PIAA Team Title

HERSHEY — The Reynolds Raiders have done it again.

Thanks to back-to-back, match-sealing wins from juniors Andrew Ischo (126) and Rocco Bartolo (132) Reynolds was able to turn a 25-24 deficit into a thrilling 30-25 victory over Southern Columbia in the Class AA Team Championship match.

The win gives Reynolds a second straight team championship and its record-setting fifth, overall. The Raiders also won titles in 2006, 2007 and 2009.

Reynolds becomes the first AA team to win five titles, surpassing Bethlehem Catholic, the team that won four straight from 2011 to 2014.

Counting the eight team-points

titles, Reynolds has now won 13 PIAA wrestling titles.

The difference in the state finals match-up was bonus points as both teams won seven individual matches.



Reynolds was able to gain nine bonus points thanks to a trio of falls from seniors Cole Matthews (138) and Hunter Michaels (145) and freshman Gary Steen (106).

The Tigers (21-1) totaled four bonus points via tech falls from two of their studs - Jaret Lane (120) and Gaige Garcia (170).

Returning state champion Beau

Bayless (113) battled an incessant bloody nose but managed a 7-4 win over tough freshman Patrick Edmondson, while senior captain Jarod Miller was Reynolds' other winner, scoring a 5-2 decision over Quinton Lear in a battle of state-ranked wrestlers.

The RHS wrestlers who did not win their individual matches played an equally important role in the victory because they fought hard to keep their matches close.

For example, sophomore Bryce McCloskey (182) lost by a single point, junior Derek Skeehan (285) lost by two points and junior Mason Wilkerson (152) by three -- all against state-ranked opponents.

At the end of the day, it was a total team effort that led the Raiders and Coach Casey Taylor to another state championship. And

truth be told, every ounce of that effort was needed because Southern Columbia proved to be an outstanding team with exceptional talent.

By finishing 25-1, the Raiders set a single season school record for most wins. That breaks the old mark of 24 set back in 2013-14.

Reynolds is 48-1 the last two seasons — 92-8 in its last 100 matches — and this year's seniors have won four PIAA Team medals finishing 3rd, 3rd, 1st and 1st.

Reynolds' only loss this season was to Canfield, 34-33, back on Dec. 16. Canfield was a Division II dual match semifinalist in Ohio.

Reynolds finished the season with 20 consecutive victories, including an impressive, 31-29, win over Cathedral Prep, a team that finished third in the Class AAA tournament.

Reynolds opened the state duals on Thursday, Feb. 8 with a 64-6 win over Honesdale, before defeating Bishop McDevitt, 55-9, in the Friday morning quarterfinals.

The Raiders then knocked off District 4 runner-up Muncy, 40-16, Friday night to set the stage for the Saturday's state finals showdown with Southern Columbia.

Mercyhurst entered February with a perfect dual season. They kept it going by defeating Seton Hill and Shippensburg while extending their win streak to 11. Freshman **Gavin Wilkerson** ('17) was pinned against Seton Hill and won by forfeit against Shippensburg.

The Lakers' magic ran out when they faced a tough, sixth ranked Pitt-Johnstown squad. Wilkerson lost a major decision to Devin Austin, who is ranked 9th in the country by Intermat, as UPJ scored a 32-10 victory.

Gavin closed out the dual season on a high note, pinning former national qualifier Chris Matthews of Gannon. Gavin's pin was the only bonus points for the Lakers, as they lost, 20-15.

LOOKING AHEAD — Beau Bayless will begin his senior season with 120 wins and three state medals. He will look to join some very exclusive clubs as he begins his final season.



Reynolds will begin 2018-19 with a modest 20-match win streak, and Coach Casey Taylor will begin his 8th season at 158-18.

Reynolds will look to win its third straight state championships in both dual match and team points competition.

The Raiders will have two state champions (Bayless and Gary Steen), four state place-winners (add in Ischo and Rocco Bartolo) and six state qualifiers (add Kaeden Berger and Derek Skeehan) in its starting lineup.

Reynolds will enter its 59th season with an all-time dual match record of 840-95-2.

Matthews, Steen Strike Gold!!

Raiders Capture a Record 14th PIAA Wrestling Championship

HERSHEY — The Reynolds Raiders put an exclamation mark on another sensational season by crowning a pair of state champions and winning a record-setting 9th team points title at the 2018 PIAA Class AA Wrestling Championships March 8-10 at the Giant Center.

Senior Cole Matthews (138) capped a 177-win career with a second state title and freshman Gary Steen (106) polished off a brilliant rookie season with a gold medal.

They are the 27th and 28th state champions in RHS history. Reynolds' 9 team points titles are a PIAA record. No team has won more. Reynolds' combined 14 state championships (counting the 5 dual match titles) is also a PIAA record.

Also earning all-state honors for the Raiders were Beau Bayless (3rd, 113), Rocco Bartolo (3rd, 132), Hunter Michaels (5th, 145) and Andrew Ischo (6th, 120).

Bayless is now a 3-time PIAA medalist and Ischo's medal was his second.

Freshman Kaeden Berger (1-2, 126) and senior Jarod Miller (1-2, 195) also represented Reynolds at the state tournament.

"I don't even know where to begin," said Casey Taylor, who won his fifth state championship as the RHS coach. "What an outstanding weekend for our wrestlers."

"I couldn't be more proud of the efforts of our guys — all eight of them can and should feel like they are part of this championship because they all won matches to

contribute to the team points title," Taylor said.

After winning gold as a freshman, Matthews placed third and second at the past two state tournaments. He rose back to the top of the podium in 2018 with a pair of pins and a major decision among his four wins.

"Never a doubt," said Taylor when asked if he thought Matthews would get the gold. "He completely dominated his weight class."

Matthews closes his career as one of the most accomplished wrestlers in school history, finishing with four state medals and a 177-15 record.

He reached 100 career falls at the state tournament, finishing with 101 to smash the former school record of 83 previously held by his brother, Austin.

Cole has signed to continue his academic and athletic careers at

the University of Pittsburgh.

"They are getting one of our very best," Taylor said of Cole signing with Pitt. "I think Cole will make an impact there both on and off the mat. His commitment to excellence and his tremendous work ethic will be a great addition to Pitt's program."

While Matthews exits, freshman Steen enters — polishing off a fantastic freshman campaign.

Gary also dominated his weight class, pitching a pair of 7-0 shutouts while winning four matches by a combined score of 26-5.

Like his cousin, Cole, Gary won his state finals match by a score of 5-2.

"Gary has been consistent for us all season long," Taylor said. "His focus was right where it needed to

be and his superb technique and natural athleticism led him to the top of the podium," Taylor said. "The coaching staff is very proud of the way he handled himself and

was countered in the sudden victory period.

Beau finishes the season at 48-5 — the most wins of any Raider this season — and is now 120-18 in his Reynolds career.

In his first season as a full-time starter, Bartolo, a junior, rolled all the way to a third-place finish.

Bartolo (37-9) won by injury default in his consolation final to finish the tournament 5-1. His only loss was to the state runner-up, 6-3, in the quarterfinals.

"Rocco was on fire, it was so much fun to be in his corner cheering him on," Taylor said.

Among his wins in Hershey, Rocco had two falls, a major decision and a 7-0 win.

Michaels won his first PIAA medal in his third trip to Hershey and in winning five matches reached

took care of business. He is a focused young man."

Gary ends his season with a record of 45-4. His only losses were split between the Ironman and PowerAde tournaments.

Bayless, a junior, placed for the third straight season while going 4-1 to finish 3rd at 113 pounds. Beau finished 4th as a freshman and 1st as a sophomore.

His only loss of the tournament came in the championships semifinals when his takedown attempt

the century mark in career wins.

After an opening-round loss, Hunter came roaring back to win four straight matches in the consolation bracket. Included in that streak were a fall and a major decision.

He won an 8-6 triumph in the sudden victory period in his final match to finish with 101 wins.

Ischo won his second state medal and moved up one step on the PIAA podium to 6th place.

He finished 3-3 at states and was competitive in all of those matches, losing one 6-5 and another 2-0.

Miller, a senior, ends his RHS career as a state qualifier with a 74-47 record. His win in Hershey was by major decision.

Berger was not even a full-time starter early in the season but he didn't let that stop him.

He qualified for the state tournament as a freshman and posted a 1-2 record to finish the year 18-12.

Austin is on schedule to graduate from Edinboro this spring and hopes to pursue a career as a PA State Trooper.



Steen, Bayless, Matthews win NWR Crowns

SHARON — The Reynolds Raiders continued their all-out assault on the postseason at the 2018 Class AA Northwest Regional by winning the team title, crowning three champions and qualifying eight wrestlers for the 2018 PIAA Class AA Individual Wrestling Championships.

Senior Cole Matthews (138) and junior Beau Bayless (113) won their 3rd Regional crowns while freshman Gary Steen (106) picked up his first.

With his title, Matthews became a four-time state qualifier and will look to become a rare, four-time state medal winner next weekend in Hershey.

Matthews pinned his way through the tournament to move his career pin total to 99.

Bayless heads to Hershey for the third time. He is a defending PIAA champion.

Junior Rocco Bartolo (132) and senior Hunter Michaels (145) also battled their way to the championship finals and finished second. Michaels earned his third trip to Hershey and Bartolo, his first.

Reynolds' other Regional medalists were junior Andrew Ischo (3rd, 120), senior Jarod Miller (4th, 195) and freshman Kaeden Berger (4th, 126).

Ischo is heading back to the state tournament for the second time. He placed seventh in 2017.

Reynolds won the team title with 153.5 points. Harbor Creek (93) was second.

Also competing at the NWR for RHS were juniors Hunter Thompson (160) and Derek Skeehan (285), sophomore Bryce McCloskey (170) and freshman Cole Toy (182).

Skeehan and McCloskey were one win short of qualifying for the state tournament.

Skeehan lost 2-1 in the ultimate tiebreaker, while McCloskey lost 3-0. Skeehan finished the tournament with a 3-2 record while McCloskey was 2-2. Both wrestlers missed considerable time in 2017-18 with injuries.

Thompson and Toy were both 2-2.


Pennsylvania takes just one team to this event. Gary expects to wrestle in both disciplines and could compete in as many as 20 matches over the four-day event.

Matthews a Winner at Pittsburgh Wrestling Classic

PITTSBURGH— Just like he has done 177 other times, Cole Matthews walked off the mat at Fitzgerald Field House a winner.

Cole was competing as the 138-pound Team Pennsylvania representative at the 44th Pittsburgh Wrestling Classic, billed as “The Rose Bowl of Wrestling.”

While many thought Team USA and its stacked line-up would win in a romp, the PA stars showed some grit in dropping an exciting 23-21 decision. Cole and Saegertown’s Cody Mulligan - District 10’s other representative - both won their individual matches. (Full box on The Back Page.)



Cole was matched against Quinn Kinner, a two-time New Jersey state champion out of Kingsway HS. Coming into the match, FloWrestling.com had Kinner ranked No. 2 in the country and Cole No. 8. An Ohio State recruit, Kinner posted a 168-6 high school ledger. He finished 44-0 as a senior and in addition to his state title, won championships at Escape the Rock and Beast of the East.

A late first-period scramble resulted in a takedown and back points as Cole led 4-1 after the first two minutes. Kinner earned an escape and takedown in the second period to tie it. Matthews scored the winning point in a 5-4 triumph with a third-period escape.

“I haven’t been working out much the last two weeks, so my conditioning wasn’t where it should be ... I knew I had to pace myself,” Cole said. “I knew I had enough left to get the escape but I wanted to get some time off the clock, too.”

Cole was close to adding a late takedown when he countered Kinner’s shot at the edge.

“I wanted to get that takedown, but I also wanted to keep my foot in bounds and keep the clock rolling,” Cole said. (College out-of-bounds rules were used at the all-star event.)

“Cole enjoyed the role of being the underdog,” said Coach Taylor. “It allowed him to wrestle with

less pressure.”

“It was an incredible win against a highly-ranked opponent that helps him finish out an amazing high school career,” Taylor said. “Cole enjoyed the entire weekend from start to finish.”


Cole’s win moves Reynolds’ all-time record at the Classic to 4-3-1. The Raiders are on a bit of a streak, having won three straight as Mason Beckman was a winner in 2011 and Austin Matthews in 2013.

Cole is scheduled to wrestle one more high school match. On April 14, he will travel to Brownsburg, IN where he will compete as a member of Team USA in the Dream Team Classic.


