60 Years of Reynolds Wrestling Excellence

Reynolds High School begins its 60th wrestling season as one of the most successful programs in Pennsylvania history. What the Raiders have done through the first 59 seasons is extraordinary.

In fact, it's hard to walk through these statistics without sounding like a braggart, so I will do my best to make it palatable for those who do not live and breathe the Blue & Gray.

Since 1960-61, RHS has won 857 dual matches, crowned 28 individual state champions and won 15 state team titles. Five of its former wrestlers or coaches are members of the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Association (PWCA) Hall of Fame.

By itself, the 857-95-2 dual match record is enough to impress. It means that Reynolds has won 9 out of every 10 matches it has ever wrestled.

That would be a very good season. Over six decades, it's called a dynasty. Twenty two times the Raiders have finished the regular season undefeated.

Twenty individuals have combined to win 28 state championships starting with Jim Gollner in 1967 and running through Cole Matthews and current Raider Gary Steen in 2018.

Among those titles there are three-time champions Casey Taylor and Justin Nestor, and two-timers Jonathan Hazi, Matt Dunn, Mason Beckman

and Cole Matthews.

Reynolds wrestlers have won more PIAA medals (135) than any other Pennsylvania school and has the second-most state qualifiers (221). Only Easton (257), which began its program in 1947, has more qualifiers.



RHS owns PIAA records for most four-time (9) and the most three-time (17) medalists.

The Raiders have had at least one state qualifier for 46 consecutive seasons and at least one medal winner in 22 straight.

Forty three wrestlers have won at least 100 career matches at RHS. Just to crack the Top 10 one would have to surpass Hall of Famer Justin Nestor (153). To surpass all-time leader Mason Beckman (196) one would likely need divine intervention.

Reynolds won the first team title ever awarded in Pennsylvania wrestling back in 1976 and hasn't stopped winning titles since.

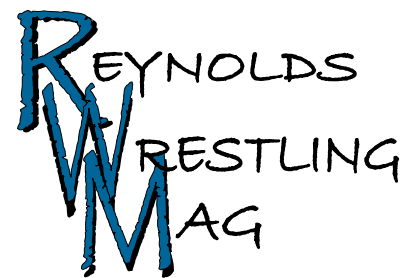
Nine times the Raiders have won the team points title at the individual state championships to go with their half

dozen dual match state titles.

Twice in school history Reynolds has won five straight PIAA team championships (counting both dual match and team points titles).

From 2002 through 2011, Reynolds won 115 consecutive regular season dual matches.

Casey Taylor begins his 9th season as head coach of the Raiders with a record of 175-18. Already, Taylor has guided 5 individual state champions and his teams have won 6 state titles.



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10 Lettermen Return to Lead Team Forward

Raiders Ready to Roll

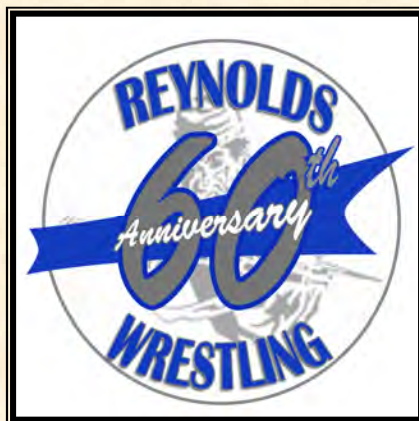
Reynolds High School begins its 60th wrestling season with a veteran group of 10 returning letter-winners to light the path forward.

“We’ve got a nice, solid group of returning starters so we’re excited about them. But, we also have a group of guys who have been patiently waiting to get their shot and step into the lineup on a full-time basis,” said Casey Taylor, who begins his ninth season as the RHS head coach with a record of 175-18. “We’ll be counting on these guys to get acclimated quickly so that we can get to where we want to be.”

Taylor’s teams have won three straight PIAA dual match championships, and while the odds are stacked against winning a fourth, it would be silly to count them out.

“We have some talent in this lineup, there’s no doubt about that; and, I

really like our balance from top to bottom. If we can get some guys healed up, get our less-experienced guys some confidence and stay healthy, I think we’ll be right in the thick of things before it’s all said and done,” Taylor said.



Taylor’s task will not be easy and he understands there will be challenges and adversity ahead.

“Getting our less experienced guys ready for a full season of high-level competition is the challenge for myself

and for our coaching staff,” Taylor said. “There is opportunity here for those guys to step in and show what they are capable of.”

“We look forward to the challenges of winning another District 10 and PIAA championship,” Taylor added.

And with that, we dig in and see that seniors Bryce McCloskey, Cole Bayless, Brayden Herbster, Evan Miller and Adam Wilcox, along with juniors Gary Steen, Kaeden Berger, Cole Toy, Jordan DeCarmen and Alex Ischo will form the heart of this year’s team. They are the 10 returning lettermen and will be counted on to carry the bulk of the load while the less-experienced wrestlers develop.

Steen is the most decorated of the group, having already won PIAA gold (’18) and bronze (’19) medals. He begins his junior season ranked No. 11 in the country at 113 pounds with an

87-6 career record. Gary had a busy “off-season” highlighted by All-American honors at the U.S. Greco Roman Championships in Fargo.

“Obviously, Gary has already had a lot of success, but he continues to impress me with his work ethic,” Taylor said. “He’s just a hard-working, driven young man who continues to work hard day in and day out. We’ve been impressed with what we have seen from him in the practice room.”

Berger is a returning PIAA medalist and a two-time state qualifier. Last season, he finished 7th in the state and won 34 matches with 16 falls, second only to Steen (22) among returning wrestlers.

“Kaeden was very busy in the off-season and continues to get better and better,” Taylor said. “He’s proven to us that he can wrestle with anybody and I get excited thinking about all that is ahead for him.”

Bayless and Toy were state qualifiers in ’19, both finishing one win short of all-state honors.

For the younger wrestlers preparing to step into the starting lineup, they need look no further than Bayless as a shining example of how it can be done.

Cole didn’t become a full-time starter until mid-December last

season and he quickly blossomed. He finished with 25 wins, including two at the state championships.

Recently, Cole announced his intention to attend Harvard University, where he will join his brother, Beau, a 2019 RHS grad.

"A special kid, from a special family," said Taylor. "We love having him back and will look to him to provide some senior leadership."

Toy started as a freshman and sophomore and has done nothing but impress. He is 57-31 through his first two seasons and was one win short of a state medal last season. He seems destined for even higher honors this season.

"Cole is a joy to coach. He's such a great competitor, you can never count him out in any situation," Taylor said of Toy. "He's a throw-back, an old-school grinder with a great work ethic who is very determined when he steps

on the mat."

McCloskey and Herbster are both returning Regional qualifiers and Ischo was a D-10 contestant.

Dogged by multiple injuries early in his career, McCloskey stayed healthy last season and thrived, just missing a trip to the state tournament while getting his hand raised 27 times. It would surprise no one to see Bryce in Hershey battling for a spot on the podium.

In balloting by team members, McCloskey and Bayless have been named team captains.

Herbster started last season at 195 pounds and was legit, advancing to the District 10 finals and qualifying for the Northwest Regional. He finished his junior season with a 22-13 record. Fueled by that success, look for Herbster to take his senior-year performance to another level.

Ischo won 10 matches last season while spending most of the year wrestling above his preferred weight class. Blessed with natural explosiveness

from all positions, Alex will be a threat to every opponent he faces.

Wilcox was impressive with a 26-win freshman campaign, but has been stuck behind a couple of state-caliber teammates in the two seasons since. He'll be counted on to help solidify the Raider lightweights.

Had it not been for injury, DeCarman (160) would have certainly had even more success last year. Jordan won a half-dozen matches, five of them by fall, while flashing a promising skill set. He continues to work hard and when at 100 percent, Jordan has the ability to be a difference maker.

Miller (220) and junior heavyweight Rocco John Daniello will keep Reynolds formidable in the upper weights despite the losses of state qualifier Wy-

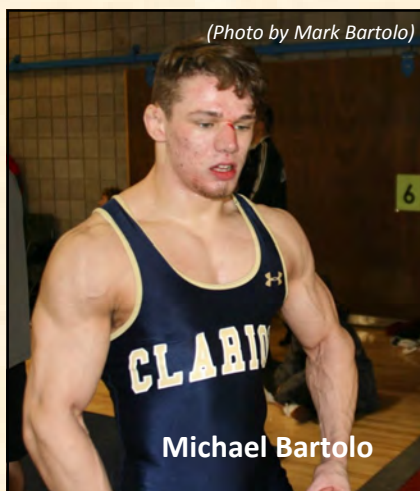
It's the most wonderful time of the year ... wrestling season!

College wrestling has about a one month jump on high school wrestling and there are an amazing 16 former Reynolds High wrestlers competing in college. Sixteen! That gives us a lot of ground to cover, so off we go!

Gage Bayless ('17) and **Chaise Hauck ('17)** are juniors at the University of Chicago. Both are studying at the college's Paris campus this semester and will return to the mat in the second semester. Gage and Chaise are neuroscience majors.

After being injured in his redshirt senior season at Edinboro University, **Austin Matthews ('13)** has been granted another season of eligibility to compete by the NCAA.

He enrolled as a graduate student at the University of Northern Colorado and earned the starting spot at 165 lbs. He made his Bears' debut at the University of Northern Colorado Open. On a bit of a pitch count in an effort to stay healthy, Austin advanced to the semi-finals with a pin



and major decision, before being pulled from the tournament. He was similarly held out of a dual with West Virginia, as the match was well in hand when his spot came up. In his most recent action, Austin was bested by Ricky Padilla as Northern Colorado dropped dual against host Fresno State. Austin is currently ranked 10th in the nation by Flowrestling.

Austin's younger brother, **Cole Matthews ('18)** is also nationally ranked (No. 17) and has been impressive early as a starter for the University of Pittsburgh.

He began the season winning the 141 pound fresh/soph division title at the Michigan State Open, going 4-0. He followed that up by using a tight cradle to pin #13 Josh Heil during a dual against Campbell. When third ranked Ohio State came to town, Matthews drew a

tough task, taking on the nation's topped ranked wrestler -- Luke Pletcher. Cole earned the first take down, but it was all Pletcher from there as the Buckeye rolled to a major decision. Next, Cole dropped a heartbreaker against Lehigh in sudden victory, but his Panthers upset the No. 7 Mountain Hawks to help ease the sting.

Cole's Pitt teammate **Cole Rickert ('17)** dropped a highly-competitive match to returning national qualifier Demetrius Thomas at the Blue-Gold wrestle-off match. He then missed the Michigan State Open due to illness and more recently went 0-2 at the Mat Town Open.

Clarion's **Mike Bartolo ('15)** went 3-1 to finish second at the Clarion Open, his only loss to Penn State's Joe Lee. Mike only allowed two points combined in three matches on his way to the finals. An minor injury forced Mike to miss a dual against George Mason, but he returned the following week, dropping a pair of decisions at the Boilermaker Duals.

Also at Clarion, **Hunter Michaels ('18)** went 1-2 at the Clarion Open, with both losses to Clarion teammates. Hunter also got some varsity action at the recent Boilermaker duals, pinning his opponent from the University of Indianapolis in under a minute. It was the first dual-match victory of Hunter's career.

Joel Leise ('17) and **Andrew Ischo ('19)** are both wrestling for the Gan-

att Owen and state place-winner Derek Skeehan.

Miller and RJD were PowerAde JV champions last season (as was Cole Bayless before he became a full-time starter) and appear ready for prime time.

Miller, who lettered as a sophomore at 182 pounds, also had a strong showing in placing 5th at the intense Wadsworth (OH) Tournament.

As far as the starting line-up, it should look something like this:

Sophomore Kane Kettering will go at 106 pounds followed by Steen (113), Bayless (120) and probably Wilcox (126), although he will be challenged by talented junior Liam Foore. Phoenix Basora is also a candidate at 126.

Kettering was 6-3 in part-time duty last season. A year-round wrestler, don't be surprised if he hits the ground running.

The 132-pound spot will go to either sophomore Clayton Rhoades or junior Dreyvin Livingston. Rhoades was 4-0 in limited action last season and talent wise, both are worthy of the position. Promising freshman Tino

Gentile will start the season on the injured list but will be in the mix when he gains the necessary medical clearances to return.

Look for Berger at 138 pounds with Ischo (145) to follow. Talented freshman Brayden McCloskey will challenge at 145 but could be used elsewhere in the lineup.

The most-competitive weight class might be 152 where senior Jarred Wilkerson, sophomore Camren Klenke and freshman Jalen Wagner are all in the hunt, as is Brayden McCloskey. Though Wilkerson has an edge in experience, it will be an intense elimination process to see who emerges.

DeCarmen will be the man at 160 when he's ready to go with Owen Miller being used in the interim.

From there on up, the Raiders appear rock solid with Toy (170), Bryce McCloskey (182), Herbster (195), Miller (220) and RJD (285). Also in the mix in those upper weights are sophomore Mitchell Mason and Keith Palmer, the latter who is wrestling at RHS via a co-op with Keystone Charter School.

Looking at the big picture, there have been some early-season setbacks and

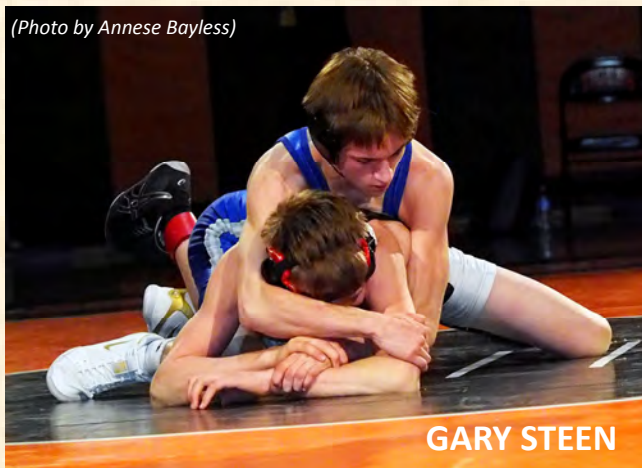
there are multiple starters who may miss opening day, but as those individual wrestlers work the kinks out, the lineup will really begin to take shape. Look for Reynolds to improve as the season progresses and as the lineup adds its missing pieces.

"I think adversity is something that every team experiences at some point, you almost have to expect it and prepare for it," Taylor said. "We don't look for shortcuts or shy away from adversity - even though it can be painful in the short term - because those challenges are exactly the types of things that can bring a team together over the course of a season."

In addition to Coach Taylor, the varsity staff is comprised of assistants Michael Hills, Marty Taylor, Armando Sciuillo, Michael Edwards, Jamar Henry and Jeff Linn. The junior high staff includes Coach Mark Higbee and assistants Chris Bell, Levi Stoyer and Austin Moffett.

Reynolds will open its 60th season on Saturday, Dec. 7 at the McDowell Tournament in Erie. The first dual match is at Conneaut (PA) on Dec. 11 and the first home match is against Franklin on Dec. 19.

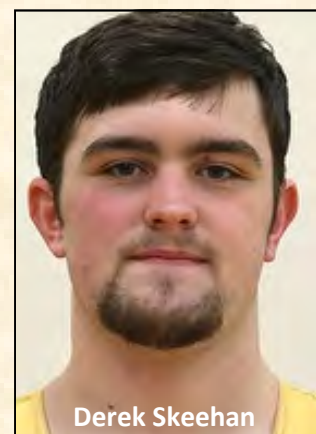

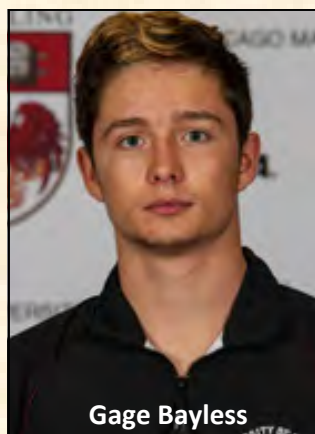

non Golden Knights.

Wrestling at 125, Ischo went 3-2 and placed 6th in his collegiate debut at the Mt. Union Open. Meanwhile, Leise was dominant in winning the 184-pound bracket. Joel had two falls and a 7-0 shutout. Later, Joel was a 7-1 winner as Gannon shutout Long Island University in a dual match.

Andrew used two wins to advance to the semifinals at the Storm Open, where he dropped an overtime decision to Ohio State's Jacob Decatur. Andrew finished fourth when he forfeited to his teammate, nationally ranked Jacob Dunlap, in the consolation finals. Leise was third at the same event, going 3-1, with his only loss a 3-1 decision to Ohio State's Garrett Hoffman.

WVU redshirt junior **Seth Hogue ('16)** got off to a hot start, placing 5th at the Southeast Open at Virginia Tech. Seth went 3-1, his lone loss a 3-2 decision to Brock Mauller of Missouri, who is ranked No. 2 in the country.

Seth then went 3-2 to finish fifth at the Mountaineer Invitational at

Appalachian State. Next, Seth lost to talented freshman, Andrew Alirez at a dual with Northern Colorado.

More recently Seth was pinned by Army's nationally ranked P.J. Ogunsanya.

Also at WVU, **Rocco Bartolo ('19)** saw his first college action, going 3-2 at the Clarion Open. He started his career with a pin in the prelims.

Baldwin-Wallace sophomore **Jarod Miller ('18)** started his season with a fall at the Ithaca Invitational. He then gave the eventual tournament champion, and No. 1 ranked D-III heavyweight in the country, his closest bout of the day, a 5-1 decision.

He won twice more in the consolations, before being ousted in tie-breaker to the eventual third-place finisher.

Jarod had an even stronger performance at the Trine Invitational, where two pins and a technical fall advanced him to the semi-finals. He then lost a decision to the eventual tournament champion and placed fourth. Jarod was later victorious in

his first dual action, winning by decision as BW trounced Ohio Northern, 28-6.

Freshman **Hunter Thompson ('19)** is also rostered at Baldwin Wallace, but a medical procedure will keep him from competing this semester. He's targeting a

January return to the mats.

Ivy leaguer **Beau Bayless ('19)**, a freshman at Harvard University, earned fourth place at his first college tournament - going 3-2 at the Bearcat Open. Beau built on that finish with another strong showing at the Keystone Classic, hosted by the University of Pennsylvania. Beau went 3-1 to finish third, his only loss, a decision to No. 11 Michael Colaiocco of Penn.

In his only action of the young season, Mercyhurst junior **Gavin Wilkerson ('17)** went 0-2 at the Findlay Open competing at 174 lbs. Gavin is currently sidelined with an injury. He tells RWM he expects to miss most, if not all of December.

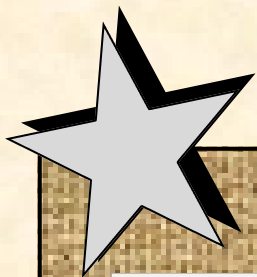
Derek Skeehan ('19), a freshman at Kent State-Tuscarawas, had a strong start to his college career, going 3-1 to finish second at the King of the Mont tournament at Penn State/Mont Alto. Next, Derek went 0-2 at the W&J Open, his second loss came to a familiar foe in former Lakeview and Greenville heavyweight, Max Wills of Jamestown Community College.

Derek fared much better at the Battle Royale (Alderson Broadus University), where his 2-1 record earned him a runner-up finish. Even more recently, Derek went 2-2 at the Scotty Wood Duals.

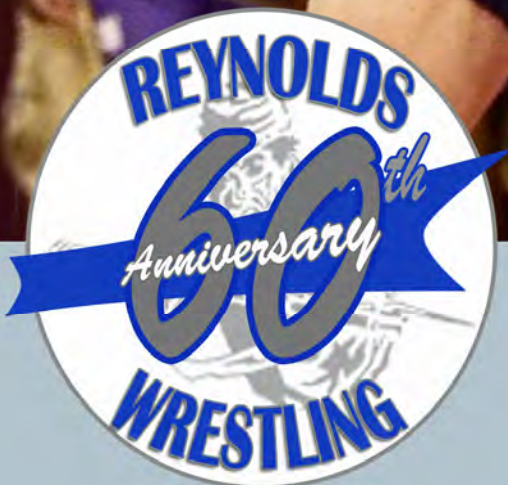

Steen Joins the Elite Co.

Elite is a word that Brian Hills began using to describe some of his better wrestlers.

Brian, the legendary RHS Coach who retired in 2011 with a record of 371-38-1 having coached 17 PIAA champions, certainly had some guys who fit into that category. Casey Taylor, Justin Nestor, Matt Dunn and Mason Beckman come to mind quickly, but there were, of course, others.

We're also blessed to be watching an elite wrestler today. Gary Steen has proven to me that he belongs in that exclusive category.

The truth is one doesn't win Ironman by accident. Winning a Powerade title can be just as difficult depending on the field in a given weight class. Winning both in the same month is

downright dirty.

It Ironman, Gary beat two nationally ranked wrestlers. He was so dominant



in his quarterfinal match that his opponent was disqualified for stalling. That's something that is unheard of at a tournament of Ironman's caliber.

At Powerade, Gary's theme has been: "Class AAA State Champion Beware."

Gary defeated Carter Dibert of Franklin Regional, 5-2, in this year's

finals. Dibert is a defending AAA state champion.

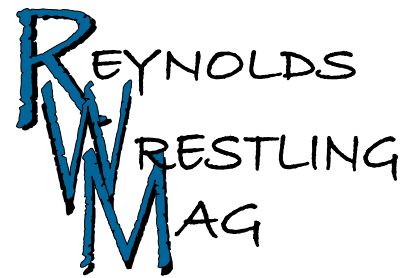
When he won the tournament last year as a sophomore, he defeated Seneca Valley's Dylan Chappell, who would later be the AAA runner-up (losing to Dibert in the finals.)

And, if you go back to Gary's freshman season at Powerade, he beat Seneca Valley's Alejandro Herrera-Rondon in the consolation semifinals. Herrera is a two-time AAA state champion.

That's the kind of resume that belongs only to a select few. The elite.

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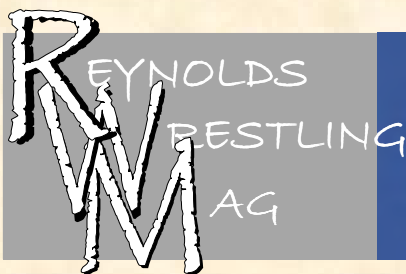

Steen Wins Ironman Title

Joins Dunn & Beckman as only RHS champs

CUYAHOGA FALLS, OH— Gary Steen became just the third Reynolds High wrestler to win an Ironman Tournament title, as he paraded his way through the 113-pound bracket to earn top honors at the 26th annual event held Dec. 13-14 at Walsh Jesuit High School.

Gary joins Matt Dunn and Mason Beckman as the only Raiders to win Ironman titles. Mason did it twice and Gary will have the opportunity to equal that feat next season.

Gary was the only Raider to earn an Ironman medal this season.

He began the tournament as the No. 3 seed and opened with a 4-0 decision and followed that up with an 11-2 major decision in round 2.

In the round of 16 he advanced thanks to a 7-1 victory. Then in Friday night's quarterfinals there was a bit of a bizarre occurrence as his opponent was disqualified for stalling.

That win put Gary in Saturday's semifinals where he faced No. 2 seed Erik Roggie of St. Christopher's, Virginia. The result was the same as Gary marched on thanks to a 2-0 victory.

Then in the championship finals, Gary knocked off top-seeded Brett Ungar of Notre Dame-GP, 6-4, in a clash between two of Pennsylvania's best wrestlers. Ungar was a New Jersey state champion last season before enrolling at Notre Dame prior to the start of this season.

Kaeden Berger (138) won two matches to lead Reynolds' other entries.

Adam Wilcox (126), Alex Ischo (145), Jalen Wagner (152), Bryce McCloskey (182) and Rocco John Daniello (285) each won one.

Kelsey McAdoo Makes History

Becomes First Female in School History to Win a Varsity Match

CONNEAUT, OH—Kelsey McAdoo made history by becoming the first female in the 60-year history of Reynolds Wrestling to win a varsity match. It happened on Tuesday, Dec. 17 as the Raiders blanked host Conneaut, OH, 82-0.

In accepting a win by forfeit at 106 pounds, McAdoo gained her spot in history.

It was certainly the biggest news on what was otherwise an uneventful evening.

Cam Klenke (152) stepped into the varsity lineup and threw two dozen points on the board in a 24-10 victory. His was the only bout of the night not to result in six team points.

Adam Wilcox (126), Clayton Rhoades (132), Kaeden Berger (138), Alex Ischo (145), Jalen Wagner (160), Owen Miller (170), Bryce McCloskey (182), Mitchell Mason (195) and Rocco John Daniello (285) all had pins.

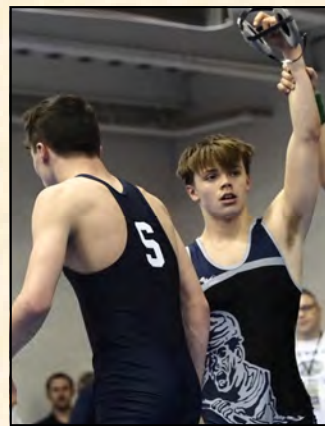

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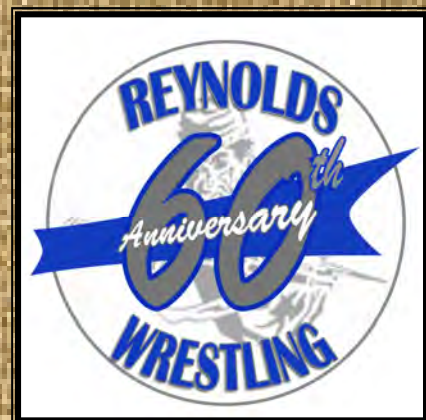

Five teams, one more than last year's inaugural event, took part in the competition.

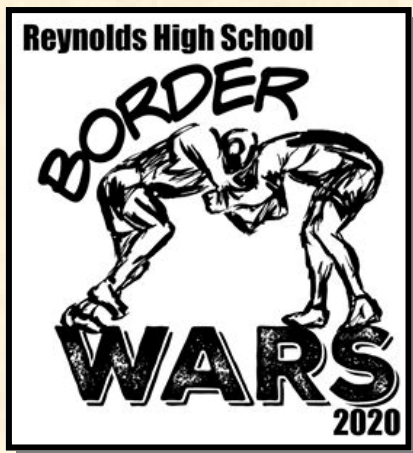
Reynolds opened the day with a 61-6 win over St. Vincent's-St Mary's (SVSM) of Akron, OH.

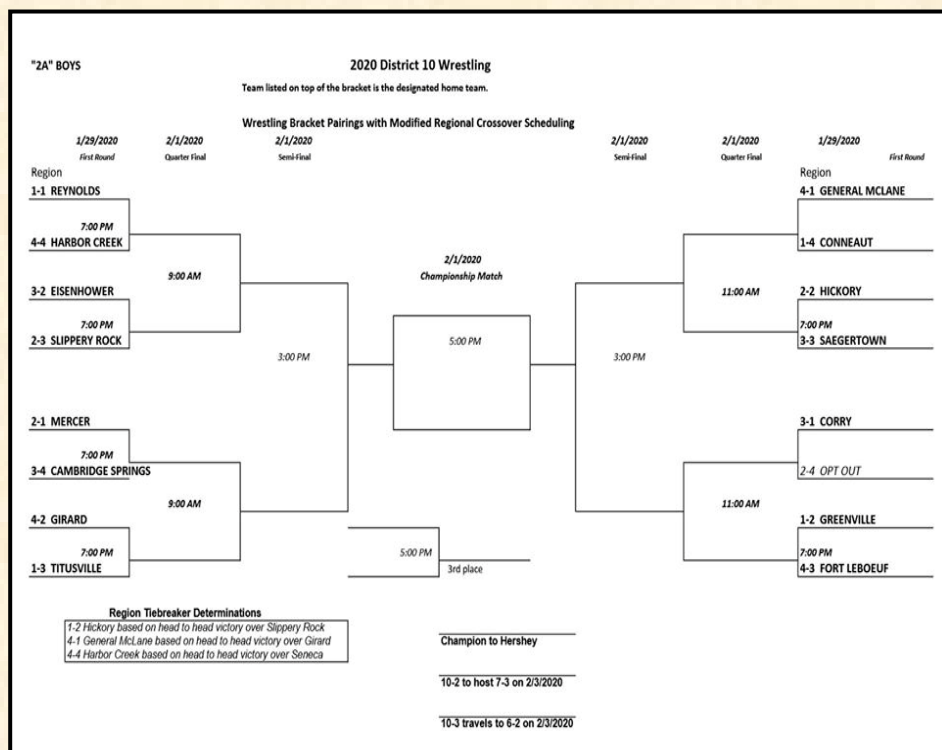

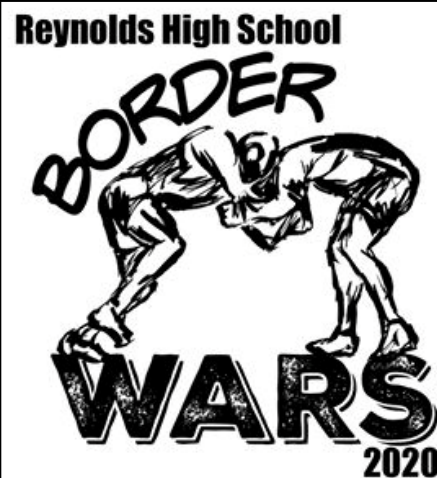

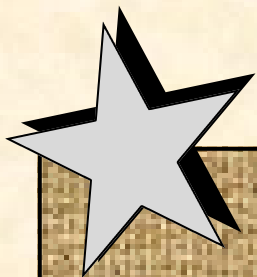
